With loppers, clippers and even power-driven trimmers the group groomed the banks of the creek to improve access to the good water where, hopefully, the trout will be waiting. Over the years the work done by the Rabun Chapter has steadily improved the stream for use by the campers. A big thanks to the following for their hard work: Pat Hopton, Terry Rivers, Justin English, Dave Ruth, Fritz Vinson, Frank Tolbert, Ray King, Larry Walker, Louisa Hanney (a ringer from the UCCTU), Charlie Breithaupt, Kathy Breithaupt and her cousin Jody Toetschinger, all the way from Minnesota. Louisa and Dave won the "wet and dirty award!" We "got 'er done". This work project that was held on May 30 was conducted in memory of Reginald "Sonny" Covington, 1936-1959. Rabun Chapter member Doug Adams recently made a monetary donation in memory of his dear boyhood friend, Sonny. Doug and Sonny grew up together in Decatur, GA fishing the local streams there. They soon started fishing the streams in North Georgia, where Doug caught his first trout and thus began a lifelong love of trout fishing. It was with Sonny that Doug first fished the Chattooga River in 1955 and it was also with Sonny that he made his first Western fishing trip in 1957. 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From The Dredger, May 8, 2013: Hiked in and wet a line at 7. #14 Cahill duns started dancing around 730. #18 Cahill hatch at 8. Trout species hat trick by 830. Added bonus of two red eyes along the way. Last two trout on the swing thru the darkness at 9pm. Fairies lit the walk out. Cold brew, stars, and bluegrass back at the car at 930. Not a bad ending to a work day!





From The Dredger, a Mid May run to the Natahala DH: Two sizes of cahills and three favors of stonefly (lemon, lime, and some large grapefruits) filled the Andrews skies last night. Sporadic large helicopters launched during daylight hours. Whitewashed versions of the copters hovered over the riffles at dark30 (see coffin pic).

Switch was on from when I got there til 855pm. Dries were best in last hour. Sure beat Monday's dark30 trip to Chattooga DH, which ran 69 degrees due to hot spell. It had fished great over the weekend (maxed at 65f).

My Go-to rig was 14 Cahill on 5x with a 16 soft hackle hares ear three feet off the back, on 6x. Add one size 6 dinsmore shot about 8 inches above the wet, and high stick that rig thru riffles and boulder fields. Stay out of deep pools if you're into numbers.

All three stocked species and a bunch of wild rainbows to hand. Think I caught some small wild browns, too. Got tired of catching them, so I cut off the wet and stayed on top to gimme a break.

Almost had lifetime supply of bucktails, too. Unfortunately, they were all attached to bucks' butts. Thank God for near misses on Wayah Road's trip home.

Go get em, folks. And watch around the curves on your drives home!

It's getting close to the time of year when many Rabunites go west. There is a group of Rabunites planning a really west of Hiawassee trip to Alaska. Just to give them some incentive to fish hard a Rabunite friend to all of us sent in this photo of Ray Gentry that was taken on the Dog Salmon River on one of their numerous trips to Alaska. This photo was from a trip in June of 2003 where Ray caught this native 30" rainbow trout that fought like a prize fighter for ~30 minutes before it was caught and released. It was a great day for Ray!! It's great to have him back in our company. God bless all those who prayed for him! From Mack Martin.





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From Peter Croes: 2015 Cherry Hill Campout Fishing

Arrived early at the Cherry Hill camp site to assist Wayne Prosser with our tent setup. In spite of Terry Rivers comments that he and Phil had already caught the gooduns we hooked up with Jim Kidd for fishing later that afternoon in a section I had only herd of referenced with the greatest respect from the founders and descendants of Double Bit. Kidd had warned me that it would be challenging just to hike down to *the River* and back out and I said I was all in . . . perhaps was the premonition!

When pulling out of the campground we made a right and an immediate left up a long narrow dirt road sometimes I could reach out the window and touch the red clay banks above the roof of the cab ... finally we reached an area called Round Top and rigged up as I could hear, between the birds, the faint sound of *the River* below. We began our hike, or better put slippery trail descent, to the lower elevations where, after the 25 minute journey we stopped and Jim advised me that they would meet me at this stump at 4:00 pm/16:00 further pointing to a distant bend where he stated the trail entered *the River* there below the Pig Pen and I needed to follow it back to the stump while making a vague reference as to follow the trail to the right when I crossed the creek (at the footbridge) ... he also indicated that I follow the trail, from the stump, down to *the River* was deep in several sections and I would need to pick my spots to wade/cross. If I had done that I probably would still be looking ... I am glad that I was literally WET WADING and the water temperature was 58F. The water was moving at a rate seemingly higher than the Burrell's Ford 1.2 and 130 readings from earlier in the day.

Changed flies and dropper combinations several times and, as luck would have it, had one good breakoff and a couple of hook set misses. In between those, during my trek upstream, I did my best to navigate the water while climbing over obstacles and under vegetation along the banks . . . occasionally exiting *the River* to find a way around tight areas where my staff was completely submerged to touch bottom.

Needless to say there were more than a couple of missteps where I was in-the-water as well as a twist around one leg and another instance where a rock shifted over my boot and I had to extract my foot with great strength and vigor. During part of the journey upstream I broke my rod down and placed it inside a "field transport sleeve/sock" I had made for exiting the woods after a day of fishing although this was while I was chest deep in the water!

Well, I finally made it up to the area where the trail came to *the River* and began fishing there hoping for better luck as my knees were very tender and my clothes finally drying out (my long sleeve shirt in my SIMMS Pack was even wet) and I had decided, after changing flies several times, that it was time to begin the trek back to the trail stump. After a few minutes I observed Wayne walking down the trail to check on, and inquire, as to my fishing success. I told him that that stretch of water was way above my pay grade and I should have had an inner tube for some of the crossings. As we walked further down the trail we encountered Jim who indicated that the water was moving too fast for the area he intended to fish and we continued back toward the trailhead stopping momentarily for he and Wayne to discuss a dead white pine tree (forestry experience) adjacent to the trail that they estimated to be about 150 years old; my comment was that if it fell it would go completely across *the River* and quite possibly create an immediate Dam.

Once we reached the stump we began our steep ascent with Jim Kidd in the lead (Prosser says he's part Billy Goat) and it took well over 45 minutes to make the climb. During that uphill journey Kidd was telling us that in the old days Doug Adams, Bill Kelly, and Jim Nixon would -after work- drive their old jeep down the same trails and go fishing . . . I can visualize all of the bouncing around and the conversations they would have before/ during, and after the trips. My reward, back at the truck from Jim Kidd was a Kyle's nymph -out of one of many fly boxes in his vest- which he said was the go-to fly in *the River*.

That's the spirit which runs deep in the DNA of our Rabun Chapter and I am grateful to share in those campfire memories although Doug would say don't believe it!

Back at camp, after a shower and some Alieve, I went up to the campfire as everyone was comfortably circled up and was asked about my afternoon trip.

Well, I started off by saying that the conditions on *the River* that afternoon were well above my pay grade . . . I saw baby Jesus a couple of times and then; you Esso–B's ain't gonna believe this

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
