GOLDEN RETRIEVER





"Catchin' Corner" - December Trouting Tips Winter "Chuck and Duck"

Tip: fish deep and slow. And I mean deep - on the bottom. Most unsuccessful anglers I meet streamside seem to fish too shallow because of a short leader and/or not enough weight.

If you're brave, try the "chuck and duck" with this leader setup I'm experimenting with. For a leader, tie as much 6 or 8 lb test mono to your fly line as you can handle. Try 8 or 10 feet to start with, then work up to 12 feet for the really deep pools. To the end of the mono, knot on 18 inches of 5X tippet and put enough split shot above that knot to get your fly ticking along the bottom. I use the Water Gremlin removable split shot and will adjust my weight at each pool according to water depth and velocity. I'm typically using from one to four size BB or 3/0 shot in those big Chattooga pools. (Leave those tiny Dinsmores home til spring brings the fish closer to the surface.) Put your strike indicator right up next to the fly line. Sometimes even it will be 2-3 feet underwater, too, as you dredge the big pools with a DRAG FREE drift..

On the end of the 5x tie the egg or bugger. Off the bend of the first fly's hook tie another 18 inches of 5X and then tie on the pheasant tail. Limit backcasting to one false cast or roll cast or, better yet, a water load.

The deep, slow pools hold the most fish right now and the slow velocity gives those sluggish critters a chance to consider eating your offering. Same goes for bait anglers on our general regulation waters- get your offerings down. Many of the strikes are very light, so be ready. The light mono prevents a lot of slack, drag, and curves in your leader, and allows a straight line right to your offerings, which plummet straight to the bottom. Bring at least 6 flies of each favorite pattern and plan to leave many on the bottom as dues for your wonderful day away from responsibility.

"Chuck and duck" is not as much fun to cast as a nice dry on a tapered leader on a warm May evening. But I like catching more than casting, and the winter fish are untiring in these cold waters. A big, bulldogging brown is better than a hand warmer in improving your circulation!

I hope a few of these tips will help you to be even more successful. Most of us are not experts, but we enjoy the sport and enjoy sharing some helpful hints with others so that they can have more success, too. Feel free to share your tips with the rest of us. I have learned a lot already from many Georgia anglers, young and old, and thank you for them.

To close, one old friend has said to me, "you don't have to believe this story if you don't want to," so I'll offer the same courtesy to ya'll!

Check the water temperature here http://waterdata.usgs.gov/nwis/uv?02176930 (*c x 1.8 + 32 = *F). Fishing is better as the air and water warms into the 50's. Trout fishing across north Georgia should remain good if the water stays over the magic 40-degree mark. Grab a kid and some nightcrawlers or salmon eggs and enjoy a sunny afternoon astream! Good luck!

Steelheading THE RIVER on 11-21-09

Dredger and Foothills TU'er "Sautee" introduced three guests to the DH section of THE RIVER on Saturday. Trip leaders had looked at river flow and Doppler radar on Friday night and saw a great window of opportunity for the next day.

Athens TU'er "Leaky Waders" brought NGTO "drag-free drift" seminar graduates (and potential Rabunites) "Mudpuppy" and "Fishing" up with him from the flatlands. The fivesome hiked in from the GA side, split up at the end of the road, and safely fished from that side of river by using a buddy system (stick close to a friend while wading). Of course, the newbie trio was trained in Rabunite terminology throughout the day and also invited to the Rendezvous. All folks caught some fish, with several getting into double digits on a mixed bag of rainbows and browns as they learned how to Waah-Hoo with each hookset. Tip o the hat to Sautee for the assist to the newbies.



The newbies saw that some on-the-water practice of the dragfree drift really paid off! Hot flies were dead-drifted egg flies (salmon-colored) and golden retrievers on long leaders and 4X tippet, with enuf weight to tap the bottom on occasion in the BIG water. The river was running at 2.4 on the Hwy 76 gauge, so it was more challenging than normal, but still easily achievable in the right spots with an extra shot or two on the leader. The value of those Thingamabobbers was realized as they rode the waves well, held up all that lead with their advanced "trapped air technology," and showed attentive newbies all the fish strikes.



The highlight of the trip was young Fishing's first brook trout, a beautiful 16-inch male. We think some real fish tales will be told back at GA Southern University. The final exam on Saturday was administered on the hike out. When Fishing was asked where he caught that brookie, he correctly replied, "I don't believe I said."



Tip: Now is a tale of two rivers. Forget the river you fished during the last three years of drought. Think "steelhead river," adapt your wading technique, gear, and even flies to big water, and have fun. Fish like water. We now have lots. Perfect your big water techniques for this El Nino winter and maybe you'll grip-n-grin like Fishing, too!

Today, November 2nd, the USFS firefighting helicopter with ground support from GA and SC Forest Service personnel began delivered trout to the backcountry of the Chattooga's North Fork. The trout were provided by SC DNR and GA WRD and paid for by fishing license and trout stamp fees. The Chattooga North Fork has received annual helicopter trout stockings for over 35 years. Due to Forest Service budget constraints in GA during the past 20 years, TU in Georgia has had a "challenge cost share agreement" with the USFS. Anglers and the USFS split the helicopter costs 50-50. Currently Rabun TU's Tom Landreth Memorial Fund, GA TU Council, and the Atlanta Fly Fishing Club contribute \$1500/year to deliver GA WRD's trout to the lower backcountry of the Wild & Scenic Chattooga's North Fork and West Fork.

Status Update - Chattooga North Fork Recreation Management Plan

In August 2009, the forest supervisors of the Sumter, Chattahoochee and Nantahala national forests identified Alternative 4 of the Chattooga North Fork Environmental Assessment (EA) as the agency's final decision for the management of recreation uses for the Chattooga North Fork. The decision emphasizes year-round high-quality trout fishing and at the same time provides boating opportunities on the North Fork. On October 26, 2009, the Southern Region of the USDA Forest Service granted Georgia ForestWatch's stay request. As a result, the status quo is preserved on the river until a decision is finalized on each of the five appeals, which is expected in the spring of 2010.

USFS-SC Recreational fishing is a high priority for the Sumter National Forest. Fisheries management helps meet the increasing demand for recreational fishing. All waters on the Sumter National Forest are managed in cooperation with the SC Department of Natural Resources. A valid South Carolina fishing license is required to fish on the national forests. The Andrew Pickens Ranger District in the northwest corner of the state is best known for the Chattooga Wild and Scenic River. In addition to floating on the Chattooga, you can fish for rainbow and brown trout, and redeye bass. For trout, you'll have the best success above the Highway 28 Bridge. For a really unique fishing experience, try fishing the Chattooga inside the Ellicott Rock

Wilderness. To read more, click HERE

The USFS firefighting helicopter with ground support from GA and SC Forest Service personnel delivered trout to the backcountry of the Chattooga's North Fork again this fall. The trout that were stocked ranged in size from 5-inch sub-adults (for put and grow management) to adults. The trout were provided by SC DNR and GA WRD and paid for by fishing license and trout stamp fees. The Chattooga North Fork has received annual helicopter trout stockings for over 35 years. Due to Forest Service budget constraints in GA during the past 20 years, TU in GA has had a "challenge cost share agreement" with the USFS. Anglers and the USFS split the helicopter costs 50-50. Currently Rabun TU's Tom Landreth Memorial Fund, GA TU Council, and the Atlanta Fly Fishing Club (AFFC) contribute \$1500/year to deliver GA WRD's trout to the lower backcountry of the Wild & Scenic Chattooga's North Fork and West Fork.

USFS-GA Toccoa River Floating, Rafting and Boating Considerations - Public Notice: Those persons floating the Toccoa River are allowed passage through private lands along the river. However, according to state law, fishing, camping and entering onto private land is illegal without landowner permission, 30% of all waste output (about 136 million tons each year) result as is fishing from the river in a boat, tube, or any other floating from buildings. USFS-GA LWCF Update (10/29/2009) - The Chattahoochee-Oconee NF (CONF) HERE made the cut in the interior appropriations committee conference meeting. This is where they reconcile House and Senate budget requests. For the first time in three years, GA will receive Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) HERE funds for land acquisition. The Forest will receive \$1.2 million. This money will be used to purchase land from The Trust For Public Lands (TPL) HERE on the Oconee NF. This sets the bar for the next three years. The CONF Program Manager for land adjustment has a great tract lined up in Lumpkin County that has over a mile of trout stream. On another note - please be aware that the CONF just closed with the Conservation Fund HERE on the Dyer tract north of Helen. This 150-acre tract contained over 4000 feet of headwaters for the Chattahoochee River. By being prepared and having support, the Forest was able to acquire \$700,000 in unused LWCF last year and match it with about \$1 million from the Georgia Land Trust Service Center <u>HERE</u> mitigation money. Good for the trout and the watershed. Good things can happen if we work and let our voice be heard. Report filed by Jim Kidd, a Rabunite.




USFS-GA Chattooga River Ranger District Office wins environmental award (11/2/2009)— If there was an Olympic competition for having an environmentally friendly office, the employees of the Chattooga River Ranger District would have brought home a gold medal. This new U.S. Forest Service office building, located in Rabun County along Highway 441, was recently awarded the Gold LEED Certification by the Green Building Council HERE for incorporating dozens of energy saving features into its design and for using waste reduction construction techniques. "We felt like this was an important thing to do," said George Bain, Forest Supervisor for the CONF in Georgia. "When you look at the impacts that buildings have on our environment it is significant," Bain said. A quick glance at the Green Building Council website reveals some startling facts such as: 72% of all electricity consumption in the United States comes from buildings, 40% of raw materials used are for buildings, and


The Chattooga Old Town

"The bridge [Highway 28] isn't far from Chattooga Old Town, the site of the former Cherokee village for which the river was named. No one is completely certain, but most believe that the word Chattooga is related to a Cherokee word for crossing, tsatugi, meaning either "we have crossed here" or "he has crossed the river and come out upon the other side." European disease and forced displacement wiped out the Old Town's ninety or so inhabitants by 1775. All that is left is a flattened patch of grass, hardly bigger than a high-school football field, a place where something used to be."

This Historical Marker is located at the site of the Russell Farmstead on Highway 28 in SC.

The Chattooga River was named after the historic Cherokee town of Chattooga. The town was situated in bottomlands along the edge of the river (near the Highway 28 Bridge) from the late 16th to the early 18th centuries. It was reported in 1721 to have a population of 90 individuals and is shown on maps made by the British colonial authorities in 1722 and 1730.

The University of Tennessee and the Forest Service conducted archeological excavations at the town site from 1989 to 1994. This study identified the Cherokee townhouse, or council house, and several houses widely scattered along bottomlands near the river. The townhouse was rebuilt several times over the approximately 160-year occupation of the town. It was a circular building about 45 feet in diameter with a central hearth and benches around exterior walls. The roof was earth covered and rounded with a centrally located hole to let out smoke from their fire.

Cherokee summerhouses in the 18th century were rectangular and measured about 12 feet wide and 20 feet long.

They were built of posts set in the ground with walls of split river cane plastered over with white clay. The roofs were made of clapboard. In the cold of winter round earth-covered winter houses were used. These were about 30 feet in diameter, shaped like a cone, and contained only a small entrance and smoke hole to retain the heat from a small fire burring in a central hearth. The Chattooga Town location is protected by the Forest Service as a significant historic site.

Since the 1940's!

As I approach my 80th.year on this earth, the genesis of our shared sport is a rather dim memory, as to the exact point when fishing entered my essential being. It must have been about 8 -10 years old, and get this, on Atlanta's Peachtree Creek, with a fresh cut cane pole, string, bent safety pin and bait! The lean times of that period shaped the low, or no budget gear, so we "Huckleberry Finned it"! For the next ten years or so, till the store bought gear was acquired as kids jobs came and went. With school/sports/girls as competing interests, bait casting, spin, and finally the 9 ft."H" cane bass rod, were added. I explored the many private home/golf course ponds, within biking distance of Buckhead (invited or not!) Regardless of what else this outdoor quy had to do, there was always time for the seasonal pursuit of game/fish, usually on a learn-as-you-go basis, with buddies equally as broke and unskilled (often missing the real value of sharing a love of God's creations)!

In my teen years, I joined the Isaac Walton League, met older experienced fishermen, and in my junior year of college (GA State College a.k.a Atlanta Division) in Atlanta, was hired on as a salesman with the pre-immanent sporting goods company in the

city - Walthour & Hood. There my co-workers/customer base included the social/sporting elite of the South, including John Martin, Charles Elliot, Everett Roach (names you may not recognize, but were a part of early TV, publishing, and reporting, thru magazines, and the outdoor happenings on a regional and national level). In addition, they were willing to share time and their knowledge, which I was lacking!

To fast forward a little, there was graduation, military service during the Korean war that had me stationed on the St. Johns river near Jacksonville (N.A.S. Jax.), followed by two years as manager of a fishing lodge on the Homossasa River in S.W. Fla. There salt water/river fishing was added to my experiences! Always there was an interest in moving water, and cold water fisheries, that was satisfied in a mostly self taught manner and held my interest through retirement in 1989!

Since that date, and after a move to North GA, the way has opened up to completely scratch that itch that defines our sport, and expand, at the age of 70, into a little amateur fly casting competition and environmental pay back. Also the opportunity to be able to pass on to the newbies I encounter, some of the intrinsic values that have been exposed to me over the years, ever since that first "TUG!"
