HOOK: STANDARD DRY 12 TO 18 BODY: BROWN DUBBING TAIL: BROWN HACKLE BARBS HACKLE: MIXED BROWN & GRIZZLY WING: WOODDUCK FLANKS OR TIE IT PARACHUTE PATTERN RIB: BROWN 6/0 THREAD OR I USE SMALL VINYL RIB

Around the Bend—Stekoa Creek Park Project

Everybody needs beauty as well as bread, places to play in and pray in, where nature may heal and give strength to body and soul. ~John Muir



The scenic image is at the park, near an old grist mill site, which is located at the top of a pretty rapid...kind of gives a clue as to how nice the creek could be with more restoration work in other places.

Once a year since 1991, local charitable organizations in Rabun County prepare presentations for review by the Rhapsody in Rabun board, in the hopes of being selected as the recipient of the annual Rhapsody in Rabun Benefit Gala. The winning recipient for 2011 is the Chattooga Conservancy, for their Stekoa Creek Park project. The Stekoa Creek Park project is a cooperative effort between the City of Clayton and the Chattooga Conservancy to restore 3+ acre tract that borders Stekoa Creek, right next to State Highway 441 in Clayton, to create a new city park.

Originating in Mountain City, Stekoa Creek runs through mostly private land and bisects a large part of Rabun County before entering Chattahoochee National Forest land, and then emptying into the Chattooga River. Stekoa has been listed by the State of Georgia as an "impaired" waterway for over a decade, and is not suitable for its designated uses of trout fishing and recreational contact. For several of these years, the Rabun County Chapter of Trout Unlimited and the Chattooga Conservancy have worked together by way of an Embrace-A-Stream grant, collecting water samples from the creek to establish a contemporary record of Stekoa's water quality, and to raise awareness about the need for action to clean up the creek. Fecal coliform levels were shown to be consistently high, due to raw sewage leaking from the City of Clayton's old sewage collection system, storm drains overflowing, sediment laden runoff, and dumping from apathetic individuals. Stekoa Creek has hundreds of homes along its banks from which it is unsafe to enter or fish. Users of the Chattooga River have been warned by the U. S. Forest Service that under certain

conditions, contact with water below the confluence of Stekoa Creek and the Wild and Scenic waters of the Chattooga may carry the risk of bacterial skin infections.

The Stekoa Creek Park project aims to improve the poor status of Stekoa Creek by creating a demonstration model for restoring land along Stekoa Creek, which will be a tangible benefit to all in our community. Work to develop the park has been ongoing for over a year to clear the site of dumped debris and eradicate a jungle of invasive plants, to make way for walking paths, landscaping with native plants, and other improvements. As the recipient of the Rhapsody in Rabun gala dinner funds, the Chattooga Conservancy will be able to move faster to complete the park project and its more costly features, such as the renovation of an existing pavilion, the creation of a suspension pedestrian bridge over the creek, and additional landscaping.

Rhapsody in Rabun will be held Monday, September 12th at the Rabun County Civic Center. The elegant evening will include over a dozen local restaurants who will serve their signature dishes, wine from several local vineyards, live and silent auctions, and live music by <u>The Tams</u>, renowned for their Gold and Platinum Record awards, who will be performing throughout the evening. This particular tag, 'TU1', is the first of only a few hundred that identified Trout Unlimited, water quality and conservation as the promised goal for the extra revenue. When I was 2004-2005 chairman of the of the Georgia Council of Trout Unlimited the original idea for these tags was floated and our non-profit org. signed on, after much concern and final assurance from the powers that be that the 'vanity' fees incurred would be directed specifically to coldwater conservation efforts via the GA Department of Natural Resources / Wildlife Resource Division and not the legislatures General Fund for the politicos to plunder at their discretion. You have probably seen a few TU tags around the state since then. They look a lot like the other conservation

I received my license tag statement from the county with an tags for quail, deer, etc. that also are slated to be plucked clean by your elected misrepresentationists.

> Fast forward a very, very few years and it still seems that one can toss a Mako shark. Not only did my old truck tag go up, but rumor has it that the percentage of the 'vanity' fee directed to conservation has been cut by half, or more. The rest of it goes to - you guessed it - the General Fund. Where I come from. that's called 'breach of promise', or at the least BS. So I'm abandoning my 'vanity' and giving it back to the state. I'll use the extra money to pay for the inflated gas it will cost to go out and actually work on the trout streams.

I just hope you're not one of those who initially griped so much about the programs validity. Guess I'll see your true concern when I pull in behind you in a stream side parking lot.

Status Update – Chattooga North Fork Recreation Management Plan Upper Chattooga River Environmental Assessment

(April 14, 2011)

Last year, on December 9th the Forest Service re-initiated the NEPA process on recreation uses on the upper Chattooga River (North Fork) by scoping a proposed action. The agency asked the public for any new information. The boaters' lawsuit calls for immediate and unregulated boating access (anytime, any number of boats, and at any water level).
