"Catchin' Corner" - Trouting Tips

The following brief article is reprinted with permission from the Fly Shack Newsletter http://www.flyshack.com/ February: The Copper J

In winter, streambeds are loaded with nymphs - all the ones that began their lives in the spinner falls of the previous summer. The Copper J doesn't imitate anything in particular but it looks a lot like most nymphs and, most importantly when fish are holding near the bottom, it sinks guickly. The Copper J (compare to a Copper John) is a combination of three very effective nymph patterns, the prince nymph, the brassie, and the pheasant tail. http://www.flyshack.com/Static/Item_Bead_Head_Copper_J.htm

Tips for the "Drag-Free" Drift by Jeff Durniak, Georgia Wildlife Resources Division

- white cap at home!
- 2. From the bank, read the water: predict the trout lies and find your casting locations. (Hint: in your mind, break up a large river into a bunch of small streams.)
- 3. "Hunt" move slow; stalk like a heron.
- 4. Get Close: 10-20 feet (which means you'll have 0 to 10 feet of fly line on the water).
- 5. Split shot! Use enough to "tick" the bottom. Change the number/size of shot with each spot fished. Most marginal anglers fish OVER the trout.
- 6. Strike indicator cork, yarn, or buoyant dry fly. Put it at twice the water depth. Slide indicator up/down with each spot.
- 7. What fly? "How" is more important than "what", but standards are #8 black bugger, #12 peach egg, #14-16 prince, #16-20 pheasant tail. Hatch chart: www.rabuntu.org.
- 8. Stop false casting! Use roll cast, water load, or Belgian cast (midcurrent.com)
- 9. Cast upstream (opposite shoulder) and leave rod tip down 1-2 mentor. Pass it on! seconds after line hits water.

- 1. Dress right drab clothing & polarized glasses. Leave the 10. "Hi-Stick: raise and lower rod at same speed as the current
 - 11. "Drag-Free" strike indicator at same speed and line of travel as leaf or bubble. Most of your good drift is over when the indicator is directly across from you.
 - 12. At end of drift, hold tight and let fly swing (for hits on the uplifting emerger).
 - 13. "Paint the pool" with your casts. Three casts to good lie, then hit another. In other words, fish for all the eager fish rather than pound away at the one spooked or selective trout (exception: Smithgall). If possible, move your body instead of casting farther.
 - 14. Set the hook with a sidearm, downstream wrist snap. Strike everything, since every 20th "rock" will have an adipose fin. Waaah-HOOO! (Rabunite term for "fish on")
 - 15. Drag-Free is like learning to ride a bicycle. Practice these techniques for 30-60 minutes and they will become second nature.
 - 16. Grip and grin. Push fish out toward camera!
 - 17. Find a mentor. Learn from a better angler, then . . . Be a

As we geared up in the parking lot on the Monday holiday, my buddy remarked that he had forgotten his wading belt. We found an extra, suited him up, and then started down the path to the river. We had a great day and returned safely to our car.

That belt experience was a good reminder that streams are high and cold and lake temperatures are plummeting at this time of the year, so anglers have much less room for missteps than they did in the warmer months. So, take a little time to remember and practice safe boating and wading tips. Several popular magazines like the winter issues of Fly Fisherman and American Angler have some excellent articles on a) winter "catching" tips and b) wading safety advice. Do a little reading and invest in the survival and happiness of your fishing buddies and yourself. You'll catch a lot more fish over the years if you return home safely each evening!

A river, a past and a people - 40 years later, the battle over 'Deliverance' rages on by Brandee A. Thomas

The Chattooga River was the backdrop for the 1972 movie "Deliverance." A festival is being planned to celebrate the river as a protected resource. Event planners think tying in the movie's anniversary in with the festival will attract needed tourists to the region, while many local people feel the movie was degrading to the region's mountain culture.

The film was based on a book by the same title, written by James Dickey and set along the fictional Cahulawassee River. "Knowing that he was a South Carolinian, everyone knew the river he was talking about was really the Chattooga," said Sarah Gillespie, a Rabun County resident. This year marks the 40th anniversary of the movie's filming.

Some people would like to link the movie's anniversary with the inaugural Chattooga River Festival, set for June 22-24. The goal of the festival is to educate the public about the importance of protecting the river as a natural resource. In addition to a screening of the movie, the festival would include guided hikes along the river's banks, rafting opportunities and an adventure race. As intriguing as that may sound to some, others would like to let sleeping dogs lie and not reconnect the dots between Rabun County, "Deliverance" and its depiction of mountain folk as violent and primitive.

"While I admired the beautiful scenery on our mighty Chattooga River in the movie, my admiration stops there," said Barbara Taylor Woodall, a Rabun County native and author. "Hollywood traveled thousands of miles, smiling with money in their pockets in search of demented hillbillies. They pointed their cameras and sucked the souls out of good people. "Some people who played small demeaning roles did not even know what the movie was about." In her book, "It's Not My Mountain Anymore," Woodall describes how one local woman and her paralyzed granddaughter were portrayed "in images that acres of adjoining public lands and protect headwater streams suggested they were mountain freaks."

Gillespie, who is a Rabun County Convention and Visitors Bureau board member, doesn't share the negative views about the movie. "I know there has been some backlash in the community about the way 'Deliverance' presented mountain people. I am a mountain person, but I look at it as just a movie," said Gillespie, whose family members were in the movie. "My great-uncle was a location scout for the movie. He and his family played extras in the movie and were portrayed as some of the

less-than-desirable mountain people. "I think there are different kinds of people everywhere, that movie just portrayed a certain side of what people can be. I am a Rabun County (native) and I don't see us that way."

After film crews left, while some residents were left with a bad taste in their mouths, others appreciated the dollars poured into the community. The Rabun County website states that Hollywood "stimulated the local economy when 'Deliverance' catalyzed the whitewater rafting industry, which now attracts more than 20,000 tourists and contributes \$3 million to the local economy annually." Gillespie, who is on the festival planning committee, sees the festival-movie tie-in as a way to bring more money into the community and educate visitors.

"I have concerns about if the festival is really to celebrate the river being wild and scenic, or if it's just about dollar signs." Woodall sees no reason to celebrate.

Blue Ridge Forever receives \$500,000 grant to protect 12,000 acres in WNC and eastern Tennessee by Margaret Williams on 01/18/2012. The National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (NFWF), through Walmart's 2012 Acres for America program, has awarded a \$500,000 grant to the Blue Ridge Forever coalition for the protection of more than 12,000 acres in western North Carolina and eastern Tennessee. The grant will help conserve a network of six tracts with native brook trout and golden wing warbler habitat, provide public access for people to enjoy the outdoors and protect the natural resources that local communities depend on for clean drinking water and economic vitality.

These tracts add to the conservation value of thousands of providing prime habitat for native brook trout. The five tracts will be protected by Blue Ridge Forever coalition members - Blue Ridge Conservancy, Carolina Mountain Land Conservancy, Conservation Trust for North Carolina, Foothills Conservancy of North Carolina and Southern Appalachian Highlands Conservancy.
