### "Catchin' Corner" - Trouting Tips

<a href="May: Caddis">May: Caddis</a> - Mayflies got their name from hatching during this month, but caddis imitations can be hugely productive in May. Match larvae with common nymphs like the Zug Bug or Prince and pupae with wet flies like Sparkle Caddis Pupa - but since we're being optimistic, our fly for May is a dry fly: the Elk-Hair Caddis. (Truth be told, it may actually look like a freshly-hatched mayfly to the fish. Either way, it works.)

### FISHING REPORTS To help the agencies manage the Chattooga fishery, report HERE

Subject: I think both have been bitten!

I took two of our worship leaders at church (Justin, 26 and Brandon, 24) to The River yesterday. We stopped at the grocery store on the way and filled the cooler with some Dr. Peppers and Cherry Cokes, a rotisserie chicken, some buns, mayo, Sweet Baby Ray's bbq sauce, some macaroni salad and baked beans. Then we stopped off at Unicoi Outfitters in Helen to pick up a few more flies, a hat-flashlight, and some boots for my buddies. We finally got to the river at about 1:30 and the catching was slow to start. Within the first 30 minutes, all three of us had landed at least one rainbow each (did I mention neither had ever held a fly rod?). I also landed a nice little redeye bass in the Clarks Hill pool, so that was a nice treat.

We picked off a few more fish here and there over the next three hours, but it was slow. We worked more on casting and getting a good drift, but weren't often rewarded with a fish.

Suddenly, though, about two hours before dark, the switch was turned on. A few caddis started marching upstream, though it was very sporadic. But it was apparently enough to get the fish to look up! Justin landed four rainbows in one little stretch, all on dry flies! Just a little further upstream, Brandon landed two out of the same run! Around the next bend, Brandon hooked and landed a 10-inch brown (his biggest of the day). Just a few yards upstream from Brandon's brown, Justin spotted a bigger fish rising consistently and casted his Stimulator and EHC double-dry rig. He was rewarded with an aggressive rise, and felt the thrill of being broken off for the first time!

Just as the last light was about to slip away, the switch got flipped into the off position, though we kept fishing until we couldn't see anymore. We hiked out in the pitch dark, made our way to Clayton, pulled over in a parking lot and pulled the meat off the chicken, threw it on the buns and slathered it in Dukes mayo and Sweet Baby Rays! It was the best tasting meal I think any of us had ever had!

All in all, Justin and Brandon both got 7-8 fish each into the net! And they both had about as many LDRs! Another great thing was that both of them got their technique down early enough for me to be able to stay with them, re-tie their flies when they got tangled, coach them, but still catch 3 browns and 12 rainbows (and the redeye) of my own!

On our long drive back to the flatlands, both were asking me about the cost of all the various gear and both saying they had found a new hobby. "I've just never done anything like that before," Brandon said. Justin echoed it with, "It's so different than what we do in our normal day!"

#### I think both have been bitten!

### New Chattooga River District Ranger Selected - Edward Hunter to begin May 7

(3/28/2012 Gainesville, Ga.) – Forest Supervisor George Bain has selected Edward Hunter as the new District Ranger for the Chattooga River Ranger District of the Chattahoochee-Oconee National Forests. Hunter will be responsible for managing the district which covers 261,035 acres in the northeast part of Georgia. He begins his new role on May 7. Originally from Monroe, Louisiana, Hunter began his career with the Forest Service in 1998 as a student trainee at Uinta National Forest in Utah. Since that time he has worked on national forests in Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and Arkansas. He attended Tuskegee University in Alabama and the University of Florida where he earned degrees in Forest Resources and Environmental Science. Hunter and his wife have two children ages five and ten, and are expecting a baby in June. More info HERE

### GEORGIA MAN SENTENCED TO FIVE YEARS IN DEATH OF USFS LE OFFICER

MACON, GA (March 22, 2012) -- Norman Clinton Hale of McDonough, Ga., was sentenced today to serve five years in prison for the shooting death two years ago of U.S. Forest Service law enforcement officer Christopher Upton. Upton was shot and killed the night of March 5, 2010 by Hale who mistook him for game at the Ocmulgee Bluff Equestrian Recreation Area in Jasper County, Georgia. Three other men were also hunting with Hale, who was armed with a high-powered rifle equipped with a night vision device. After the shooting of Officer Upton, the hunting party waited over an hour to call 911 to report the incident. The men also failed to render the first aid which might have saved Upton's life, a medical expert testified. In November 2011, Hale was convicted of involuntary manslaughter, hindering a federal investigation, and hunting violations. Sentencing hearings have not been held yet for the three other men convicted of lesser offenses in this case. More info HERE
