THE WOOLY BUGGER IS OFTEN USED AS A STREAMER, BUT TIED IN THE RIGHT SIZES AND COLORS, IT MAKES A GREAT CRAYFISH, DRAGONFLY NYMPH, EGG CLUSTER, OR LEECH IMITATION. IT'S THE ONE FLY THAT HAS PROBABLY HOOKED MORE BIG FISH THAN ANY OTHER. YOU'LL WANT TO HAVE A VARIETY OF THESE FISH CATCHING MORSELS IN YOUR FLY BOX AT ALL TIMES, ESPECIALLY DURING THE UPCOMING DELAYED HARVEST SEASON. ADD BLACK, GOLD, AND COPPER BEADS TO THE HEAD FOR A SWIMMING ACTION THE FISH CAN'T RESIST.

HOOK: STREAMER 2XLONG MUSTAD 2672 TAIL: MARABOU - BLACK, OLIVE, BROWN, OR ANY OTHER COLOR DISIRED BODY: CHENILLE - ANY COLOR YOU WISH;

BUT BLACK, BROWN, AND OLIVE ARE MOST COMMON

HACKLE: SADDLE OR NECK TO MATCH THE

BODY IF DESIRED

THREAD: 3/0 COLOR TO MATCH BODY **RIB:** WIRE (GOLD, SILVER, OR COPPER)

Status Update - Chattooga North Fork Visitor Use Capacity Analysis

On January 31, 2012 the Forest Supervisors of the Sumter, Chattahoochee and Nantahala National Forests issued Final decisions notices for Alternative 13A. http://www.fs.usda.gov/detail/scnfs/home/?cid=STELPRDB5253595

Boating will be permitted on the Chattooga North Fork beginning December 1 through April 30 every year, on any day the flow reaches 350 cfs on the Burrell's Ford gauge.

The boater's federal court case with the Forest Service (demanding year-round unrestricted access at any flow) is expected to go to trial in late 2012.

The <u>Chattahoochee-Oconee National Forests</u> provide the finest outdoor recreation opportunities and natural resources in Georgia. Featuring nearly 867,000 acres, hundreds of miles of clear-running streams and rivers, approximately 850 miles of recreation trails, and dozens of campgrounds, picnic areas, and other recreation activity opportunities, these lands are rich in natural scenery, history and culture. The mission of the USDA Forest Service is to sustain the health, diversity, and productivity of the nation's forests and grasslands to meet the needs of present and future generations. The Chattahoochee-Oconee National Forests is part of the Southern Region, with the Forest Supervisor's office in Gainesville, Georgia, managing four District units in Blairsville (Blue Ridge District), Lakemont (Chattooga River District), Chatsworth (Conasauga District), and Eatonton (Oconee District)

FISHING REPORT - The Pere Marquette Trip

On September 22nd, 6 members of the Atlanta Fly Fishing Club departed for Michigan in search of Salmon on the Pere Marquette River. The members were Ed Chamberlain, Rob Kissel, Tyson Reed, Milton Sams, JD Forrester and Mike Williams. JD and Mike are also members of Rabun TU, but unfortunately because we live in Atlanta, we do not make the meetings.

We were headed to a cabin where Ed bought a week use for up to 6 people on silent auction at the Rabun Rendezvous last January and it was donated by Mike Sobaski who resides in Michigan, but I understand once was a member of Rabun TU. Mike we appreciate the use of your cabin for the week. The 6 of us were quite comfortable and enjoyed our stay.

Well, we caught fish! Many big King Salmon from the PM. Ed and I used guides 2 days and had very satisfying days on the river. The system they use up there for hooking Salmon is called "chuck and duck"; but unlike what we consider C&D here, i.e. throwing buggers, nymphs, sinkers and strike indicators is a piece of cake when compared to C&D, Michigan style. You guys are going to have to win the cabin and go there to find out what I mean !!

The guide also taught us some new fly fishing phrases! "Indie rig" means using a strike indicator and "rough hooked" means foul hooked. Just when I thought I had it figured out, I learned something new.

We also chased trout and small mouth bass. Conditions for trout were not the best so late in the year but we did manage a few from the Pine River, PM and the Ausable. We hit the Manistee as well, but had no luck. The small mouth were caught on, I believe, a lake called Tippy Pond. By the way, Mike also allows you to use his drift boat.

And lastly, some of us took the 30 minute drive to see Lake Michigan. Not much of a lake to me; more like an ocean. White caps were breaking on a cold and windy day. Hardy people live on the shores of that lake!

We had a blast! Check out the cabin if it is available at the next Rendezvous!

What's New Elsewhere?

09/24/2012 Update - Work began on the Tallulah River Bridge Replacement Project in November 2011 and is expected to be finished by the end of 2012. A message sign on the Tallulah River Road will provide the most current information. Tallulah River Bridge - The steel beams are in place. The Contractor is installing the concrete forms for the bridge deck and abutments. Some welding may be starting as soon as the concrete pours begin. Coleman River Bridge - Guardrail work remains to be completed. Also two parking areas adjacent to the bridge which will provide fisherman access to Coleman river and Tallulah river remain to be completed. Under normal circumstances, the work schedule will be 7:30am through dusk Monday through Thursday and 7:30am to 12:00pm on most Fridays. Wildcat road had been reconstructed. The road was opened to public traffic on August 31, 2012. The Timpson Creek Road, FS 162, remains closed to public vehicle traffic as work continues to clean up damage caused by the April 2011 tornado.

GA-USFS National Forests Supervisor named Federal Land Manager of the Year; 10/12/2012 (Gainesville, Ga.)--Forest Supervisor George Bain on the Chattahoochee-Oconee National Forests in Georgia is the 2012 Federal Land Manager of the Year for the USDA Forest Service. He was honored Thursday at a national awards ceremony in Washington, D.C. Among other achievements, Bain was recognized for leading a strategy to involve and engage a broad spectrum of partners, individuals and groups in the stewardship of Georgia's national forests. This includes a recent forest-wide collaborative effort with recreation trail users to help identify and maintain a diverse and quality trail system. In 2010, volunteer contributions to the Chattahoochee-Oconee National Forests amounted to the equivalent of twenty-one full time employees assisting with trail maintenance, repair and construction. GA-WRD Trout Streams Ready for Fall Anglers-Delayed Harvest Trout Streams Open Nov. 1 SOCIAL CIRCLE, Ga. (10/18/2012) Beginning on November 1, anglers should head to north Georgia for fishing in one of the five delayed harvest trout streams, according to the Georgia Department of Natural Resources' Wildlife Resources Division.

"Trout streams are designated as seasonal, year-round or delayed harvest, with different streams offering varying populations of rainbow, brown and brook trout," said John Lee Thomson, Wildlife Resources Division trout stocking coordinator. "The delayed harvest streams, which have special regulations from November 1-May 14, are regularly stocked from Wildlife Resources Division and from our partners in conservation U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Trout are catch and release, which makes for high-catch rates and angler satisfaction."

The five trout streams managed under delayed harvest regulations are:

- Toccoa River located on U.S. Forest Service land upstream of Lake Blue Ridge in Fannin County (from 0.4 miles above Shallowford Bridge to 450 feet above the Sandy Bottom Canoe Access).
- Amicalola Creek on the Dawson Forest Wildlife Management Area (from Steele Bridge Road downstream to Georgia Hwy. 53).
- Smith Creek downstream of Unicoi Lake (Unicoi State Park).
- Chattahoochee River in Atlanta (Sope Creek, downstream of Johnson Ferry Road, downstream to the Hwy 41 bridge).

GA-USFS Chattooga River Ranger District Road Work, • A portion of the Chattooga River (from Ga. Hwy. 28 upstream 09/24/2012 Update - Work began on the Tallulah River Bridge to the mouth of Reed Creek) on U.S. Forest Service land bordering South Carolina.



"Remember, during delayed harvest, these streams are catch and release only and are restricted to artificial lures with one single hook," Thomson adds. "When May 15 rolls around, the general regulations to designated trout water apply."

In addition to the excellent fall fishing opportunities that these delayed harvest streams provide, other Georgia streams offer ample year-round trout fishing. These streams are:

- Noontootla Creek Watershed: Both Noontootla and its tributaries are managed under an artificial lure only regulation and have a 16" minimum size limit in order to "recycle" the 8"-12" trout that make up most of the population.
- Dukes Creek: This stream, located on the Smithgall Woods-Dukes Creek Conservation Area, offers year-round trout fishing by reservation (706-878-3087). All fish caught here must be released immediately and anglers can use only artificial lures with barbless hooks.
- Chattahoochee River: For good trout fishing close to metro Atlanta, the Chattahoochee River downstream of Buford Dam offers family-friendly, year-round fishing for stocked rainbow, brown trout and wild brown trout. The Chattahoochee River National Recreation Area parks offer good bank, wading and boating opportunities.
- Some additional notable year-round trout streams include the Toccoa River downstream of Lake Blue Ridge, Tallulah River and the Chattooga River.

Anglers must possess a current Georgia fishing license and a trout license to fish in designated trout waters. Where can you get a license? Buy it online or find a list of retail license vendors at www.georgiawildlife.com/licenses-permits-passes or buy it by phone at 1.800.366.2661.

By purchasing a license as well as fishing equipment and related items, you and your fellow anglers have helped fund sport fish restoration programs for years, thanks to the Sport Fish Restoration Act. This Act allows funds accumulated from a federal excise tax on fishing equipment and related items to be directed to activities that benefit recreational anglers. A portion of these funds is provided to the Georgia Department of Natural Resources based on several factors, including the number of paid sporting licenses. Sport Fish funds make the following activities possible: managing sport fish populations, raising freshwater fish in hatcheries and stocking them in public waters, maintaining and operating public fishing areas and building boats and fishing piers, and much more!

Fishing Report - Goodbye Seasonals

"Dredger" and "Sautee" hit a "secret" Hooch trib on Saturday morning for a last hurrah before GA's seasonal trout streams closed. The weather was warm, the trail was human-less, the foliage was beautiful, and the fish were cooperative. The duo tossed bushy dries (parachute Adams, tan caddis) to small, cooperative rainbows and caught enough by lunchtime to quit and hike out as the Atlanta crowd hiked in to take pictures. The lunker of the day might have broken the nine-inch mark.



Two lessons were reinforced during the farewell tour:

1) Patience and Stealth are Priceless. They were the keys to success in the low, gin clear waters. If fish weren't spooked, they were gonna eat. Slowing down the stalk and looking like a rhododendron bush rather than a Hawaian sunrise helped our hunting success.



2) Wood is Good. The recent flood and the heavy leaf fall provided some slow, dammed-up areas with hiding cover for fish. Trout are very spooky in low, clear water and try their best to hide from predators. The additional large woody debris in the creeks created more productive targets for our flies. The slow, dammed up areas heightened the need for a stealthy approach. Many casts were made from several feet back up the bank.


