




## Middle School Mentoring Program







So Broderick and I went the Monday before the last day and the last day of DH. If you recall from the April Newsletter, I wrote about us having a not so great catching fish evening and Broderick whining. Well, he's not whining any more. His Birthday was May 3rd, so I went to our local shop and Rabun TU supporter Reeves Hardware and bought him a new rod and reel. I haven't caught a dad blame thing since then. On Monday night, we hit the honey hole about 5:30 and fished till dark. I worked the river up and down about a 1/4 mile and couldn't buy a fish. Mr. Crawford stayed in one spot pretty much the whole time and wore his arm out. I felt like a “Dr Pepper” ...arrive at 10; fish till 2; home by 4. It was the day after Memorial Day. It was less than 2 weeks after the closing of the Delayed Harvest. The water was low and, even though we recently had some showers, it was “gin clear”. The sun was bright overhead as we rigged up in the parking lot where there were only two cars besides ours.

We arrived at the “honey hole” to find it empty. There were no bugs and no rises. However, we both caught fish on top...mostly on Caddis. We moved on up to the run above the fallen white pine and...same thing...fish on top with no sign. Go figure!!!

**Tammy and I recently spent** an evening fishing as guests of a dear friend. Where? I don't believe I said. But what great memories were made! Tammy not only caught her first trout on a fly rod, but she caught 5 nice trout on a fly rod! All on her own with no help from me!

At about 7:00, we started at the tail of a nice run and fished our way up to a log along the bank. Along the way, I hooked two trout and let Tammy land those. But she was bound and determined to catch her own trout without my help. At the log, she started doing side-arm casts in order to get under the trees and that really helped her casting. Once she started getting her fly up against the dog hobble on the far bank she caught her first trout, on a dry fly at that! What a happy girl! She continued up to the head of the run, catching 3 more rainbows. She had it down now, and we decided to go back to the bottom of the run and fish it again.

We had seen a couple dozen green drakes hatching off, and around 8-8:30 we saw the coffin flies, way up in the air coming out of the trees. It was awesome! They were doing their dance, but none made it down to the water. I'm glad Tammy got to see the magic of coffin flies.

When we got back to the tail of the run, there were trout rising everywhere. We just sat and watched them rise from the tail up as far as we could see. What a pretty sight. One trout in particular was really rising, with big splashy rises, at the rock below an overhanging dead hemlock. We tried coffin flies but he just wasn't interested in it. I asked Tammy what fly we should try next and she said a green drake. So I tied one on

for her and she tried for the trout by the rock too, but with no luck.

But in the process she did see a nice rise up under the dead hemlock. I was sitting on the bank and I saw it too. It was a good rising fish, not a big splash, just a sipper. Tammy made a perfect side arm cast to the rise, keeping the cast out of the hemlock, made a perfect drift, and the fish took the fly! She set the hook just right, and the fight was on!

We could tell it was a good fish. It bulldogged deep, staying in the tail of the run. Tammy thought she had lost it and had snagged bottom, but it was just the fish holding tight in the deep water. "I can feel it but it won't move!!" Eventually the trout got in the fast water at the tail of the run and then Tammy had to follow it - what fun! "Help me!" "No way, you're on your own!" After 10-15 minutes she finally landed it about 40 yards downstream of the run.

A nice 15" wild brown trout! A real beauty of a fish; sighted, hooked, played, landed, and released by an even more beautiful woman. I am a lucky man.

### Fishing reports from the green drake hatch of 2014:

Due to old age and a resulting balance problem, I am now unable to wade. So like an old bear, I now just walk to a single pool which I remember has been a good green drake place in previous years.

#### May 27<sup>th</sup>: Pat H and I got there about 5:45 pm.

He went downstream to fish and I went to sit beside my selected pool. Pat came by about 8 to give me a report on his way to fish upstream waters. He had caught 4 good'uns\*\*, all RBT.

At about 8 pm I began to see rises. At 8:15 I stepped into the water to fish up the pool wading along the bank. By 9 pm I had missed 4, burned 2, uncapped 1 after a long play and landed 1 fat RBT of about 14 inches. All on dries - green drake lead and coffin fly trailer.

I then move back to the pool tail-out where I saw rises. I waded out about 5 feet and stood. I burned 1, missed a couple, uncapped another one after a long play and

then I hooked one about 9:15. I wore it down and turned on my LED visor light to land it. I reached for my net and that was when I lost my balance, falling forward face first in 10 to 12 inches of water, completely soaked! Fall score\* 9!! But I got up on my knees in water up above my crotch then landed and released that 12 inch RBT!! Credit 1 point. Net fall score – 8.

I decided to leave the rising trout and get out. I was climbing the bank when I lost my balance again and took a step back. That was not enough, I knew I was going backwards into the river. I dropped my fly rod and spread my arms. I went backwards into 12 inches of water – completely under and lost my cap! Fall score – perfect 10. Total fall score in less than 5 minutes – 18!!

My LED visor light was still on. I looked around and saw it under water and traveling downstream. I started chasing it down river (on my hands and knees). Caught up with it 10 or 12 feet down river and got it with my landing net (never would have gotten it if that light had not worked under water).

I put on my cap, finally got out, picked up my rod and went back to the car to drip off while waiting for Pat. He missed the “real action” and landed only 1 RBT upstream.

When we got home I could not find my keys to open the house door. Went back the next morning and there were my keys lying about 3 feet out in the river, right where I fell off the bank backwards into the water.

Total count for the night: fall score 18 - total trout 2 RBT – and one heck of a memory.

I did not make another cast. Pat was fishing below me and caught up to me at 8:30. I just sat there with a silly smile on my face and told Pat where I had placed other Xs. He caught a bunch of nice rainbows before lightning and a heck of a rainstorm ran us out of the river. We both love the green drakes and dark-30 trout fishing. Where? I.D.B.I.S.
