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It's that time of the year again! Unicoi OAD

Please consider volunteering to help us at Unicoi State Park's Outdoor Adventure Day to celebrate National Hunting and Fishing Day on Saturday, 9/28/13. You don't have to be an expert outdoorsman or woman to play a vital role in the day's success. Can you help at registration or direct parking? There's a niche for everyone.

Unicoi State Park staff hosts us, Game Management Supervisor Ken handles the budget, and I handle event staffing. We (DNR) need a hundred or so volunteers to make this event happen. Many of you are OAD veterans, but the following info may help prospective volunteers to understand the roles they could play and to make the decision to join our ranks. To fill out my roster and to ensure good communications with volunteers, I would like the following info from each volunteer:

First come, first served. Below is the narrative from previous years' volunteer instructions to help you understand the duties. Thanks for your consideration. We can't pull off this event without an army of vols!

Venue Info:

1. The event will be held in the big field along Smith Creek just downstream from Unicoi Lake Dam.
2. Registration & Raffle tents. These workers will greet visitors and get signed liability release forms and pens back from them in exchange for raffle tickets. Detailed instructions will be provided to you on Saturday (9/28), as Kim trains you. Visitors will put one copy of the raffle ticket into the raffle bucket of their choice and keep the other copy. They will use that copy as proof of signing the release form (so they can shoot or canoe) and as proof of a winning raffle ticket number. The raffle will start at 1 PM for free prizes. I have a small, separate work force assigned to the raffle. Volunteers on my roster are eligible for prizes, also!
3. Parking. State Parks staff will guide visitor vehicles to orderly parking in the big field. Parks staff also have a plan for overflow parking, if needed. They may need a few helpers.
4. Archery. Hands-on.
One-on-one instruction by WRD and Traditional Bow hunters Association. Note that this venue is on far side of Smith Creek, next to the laundry building. Some of you may be asked to provide security. Just stand at edge of venue and prevent visitors from straying into the line of fire.
5. Air gun. Hands on by WRD, 4-H Club, and other volunteers. Same as #4, and located next to it. Again, a few of you may secure the perimeter.

6. Skeet. Handled mainly by well trained DNR and USFS Rangers and Game Management Technicians. It's 500 yards downstream from the main event (safety, safety). A few of you may simply help at the sign-in tent and keep waiting guests away from the shooting area (no experience needed).

7. Fishing tent. This is where visitors can exchange a driver's license for a loaner fishing pole and bait. Biologists, fishing guides, TU'ers, and other fibbers can answer questions and give fishing tips. Fisheries staff will need at least 5 helpers to stay at the tent to handle loaner rod untangling, knot-tying, bait distribution, and rod checkout. This is a busy tent.

8. Fly casting. Part of the field will be set aside for casting instruction. I suggest that volunteers bring a rod that they don't mind visitors tinkering with (DON'T BRING YOUR GOOD SAGE OR WINSTON!!!). I am venue leader for casting and tying. If you tie, bring your tying stuff with you, too.

9. Fly tying. Bring your supplies and an extra vise if you have one. Let visitors sit down at the table and tie his/her own fly to take home. Variations of the woolly worm (W. bugger, Anytime/Anywhere, etc.) or San Juan worm have worked well for me in the past. Kids love a gold bead and a big, gaudy fly. Girls love pink flies. Beads from craft store, yarn from Wal-Mart. Cheap, easy, and fun for visitor. Many visitors are shy, so you may have to speak up and encourage youngsters to come over and tie their own fly. We will try to have power to the tent (if generator is not too loud), so consider bringing a small lamp.

10. Fishing - on stream helpers. Grab a pocket fishing kit (hooks and shot) and some bait (corn) that WRD will supply and go help people fishing on stream. Search them out - look at stringers, tackle used, and forlorn faces. Find a kid and work with him/her for an hour or so on reading water, casting, setting hook, etc. Mentoring! Fishing is NOT restricted to kids only (parent has the driver's license, so they must be hooked, too). Feel free to bring some of your favorite baits to help your reputation as an awesome fishing guide. We will have about 100 loaner poles available, but feel free to bring an extra Zebco outfit if you have one to loan to your "student," since we made more than 300 loans at our last event. (See item #9). Some of you can help WRD staff stock creek around 10-11 AM. Get some kids to help too - we're bringing buckets to get them involved.

11. Wildlife and Camping venues. The experts pretty much run their own shows. Volunteers here will mainly help Smithgall Woods Education Specialist Sheila Humphrey (Wildlife) with logistics needed by the demonstrators (tables, chairs, PR, food and water, etc.).

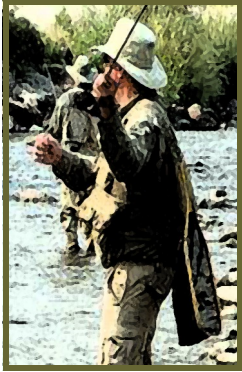

Fishing Reports

Jim Kidd and an accomplice (Dredger) recently took a short road trip north to "Elk Creek" and had a decent afternoon, given the high sun and hot weather. The duo caught a handful of wild fish each, primarily on the drop-per fished way (4 feet) below the dry. Tasty droppers were black fur ants and small cream caddis larva. One good'un churned butter when a mohair leech was dredged thru a honey hole. All trout and one pair of prescription glasses were released back to the stream. (Oh well, at least they were only Zenni's!). Dropper Duo, running late due to excessive fly flinging, took the shortest route out of the valley and bypassed the elk meadows. Maybe next time... While we were in the vicinity there was a group fishing from a dock with live bait and a bobber catching fish; and jimmy hooked a large fish preparing for a western trip. Just then the Dredger commented that we have a new proponent of barbless hooks!



We all continued up river fishing as we had been doing earlier although it was getting hotter and those waders, in the 90 plus degrees were not positively comforting in that situation. At times, I sat on the gunnels with my boots in the water fishing and actually catching some fish whilst drifting along. I only had to get out once to get the yak over the rocks; and as all good fishing goes we had to quit and get out of the water, not because it was past Dark Thirty but because we were at the designated take out area.

The yak's were loaded on the truck and we drove back to get to the launch area and then watched as the water levels rose because of the scheduled Damn release. A great day with two of the nicest guys you could ever wet a line with!

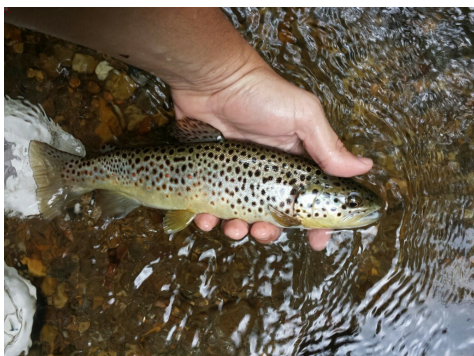

Had the opportunity, privilege, to do a road trip over to Jackson County NC and fish a creek in the East Side of Nantahala . . . and this was a first for me. As I drove the morning temperature was 58F and the noonish high maybe was in the low 70's.

After a rough walk in over rock and bolder strewn trails I crossed a ford and continued walking for another 20 or 30 minutes to get above the stress line before working my way upstream taking advantage of nature's pools with a dry fly of the parachute variety. I was wet wading in shallow water and very comfortable and only went over my knees once or twice!

The first of the wild trout I caught was a nice 10" and fun to catch. As the fishing successfully progressed upstream I remembered that there were others on the bottom and around the bottom side of the rocks and tied in a dropper . . . the wild trout of varying sizes (including those who could not take a no. 16 hook) were up to doing battle on my 3WT. their rainbow colors were beyond description and matched their remarkable fights.

The last fish of the day I caught was coloring himself for the opportunity to pass on his genes at the next opportunity. His Orange, Reds, and Gold's were brilliant and a great way to end the day . . . all that lie ahead of me was a 300 yard, damn near vertical hike, up a 50 plus degree incline to the old logging trail. Hiking up, and out, was nowhere as much fun and I am sure I sounded like an old steam engine struggling to pull the grade although that 25 minute trip to the top and comparable descent walk down the trail will also be burned in memory.

Fishing Reports

Many years ago I was inflicted with an incurable ailment known to Rabunites as "The Rocky Mountain Fever". Now I must pack my grip for a farewell trip every year to take a treatment for this ailment. If the trip includes days of catching speckled, wild trout; nights around a campfire gazing at star-filled skies; and smells of pine and sage, then it is a successful trip. While not completely curing the Fever, it suppresses it for another year... until the Fever rears its head again.

This year I spent one week in Wyoming, with several days of fishing by myself on a remote, wilderness stream that I have come to love over the years. While not catching great numbers of fish, this year I caught many larger fish than in years past. I landed two 17" wild brown trout (one on a #16 Adams on 6x tippet and a 3-weight rod!) and – my personal best – a wild 19" brown trout caught deep on a #10 black Wooly Booger.



I then met up with Jim Kidd and we fished a larger river in Wyoming. I found the Tricos at the end of their spinner fall season. Catching was good from 10:00 to 11:30 am if the sun was out and the wind calm. Unfortunately, I experienced only a couple days of that weather; most days were cloudy, cool, and windy.

The second week my beautiful wife Tammy flew out to meet me. We spent several days in Wyoming, fishing and exploring that wonderful part of the world. A friend had recommended we try dinner at the Wolf Hotel in Saratoga, WY and I agree: if you are in that area then have dinner there! It was wonderful.

Tammy and I next took a nice, day-long road trip into Colorado to the high, snow-capped mountains of the White River National Forest. We had intended to do a three day backpacking trip into the high country, but were met with more rainy, cool weather. So instead we made a warm, dry camp in a Forest Service campground. While there we met another group of Rabun County folks – who asked "How did you find this place"?



Tammy and I spent a day there taking our treatment by fishing a brook trout stream, keeping a big mess of fish, and then frying them up with taters at the campsite that night.

We finished the remaining two days of the trip by traveling to Glenwood Springs to spend time with Tammy's brother; taking a long road trip through Crested Butte, Taylor Park, over Cottonwood Pass, through Buena Vista; and on to Woodland Park where we visited my brother. The next day we began our long road trip home.

Yes, it was a successful treatment for our Rocky Mountain Fever. Until next year, at least.
