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Status Update – Chattooga North Fork Visitor Use Capacity Analysis

After boating was permitted on the Chattooga North Fork with limitations, American Whitewater filed an appeal demanding year-round unrestricted access to the entire section upstream of the bridge at any flow.

Their limitations were set at floating December 1 through April 30 every year, any day the flow reaches 350 cfs on the Burrell's Ford gauge and during daylight hours. Also, boating was not permitted on approximately 4 miles between just below Lick Log Creek and the Highway 28 Bridge.

They filed their appeal on March 6, 2014. In summary they claim, "floating is a value that led to designation of the Chattooga River as a WSR in the first place, the USFS has been charged with "protecting and enhancing" floating rather than needlessly severely restricting it. The floating exclusions in the 2012 Plan are arbitrary, capricious, and an abuse of discretion."

They also say, "Even if floating is not a value in and of itself, but rather is an important component of the recreation value or a "use," the 1971 Wild and Scenic River Study Report ("1971 Study") that led Congress to designate the Chattooga as a WSR is clear that floating is fundamental to federal protection of the Chattooga and necessary for the public's enjoyment of the white-water on the Chattooga. Section 1281(1) mandates that the USFS not limit "other uses" that do not "substantially interfere with public use and enjoyment of" the values that led to designation. The USFS's severe limitations on floating are in direct contravention of this Congressional directive."

Included in the appeal AW states, "The USFS assumes that the relationship between anglers and floaters was and is a relationship of conflict and then uses that assumption to justify its resolution of the conflict. This conflict is, however, imaginary; there is virtually no evidence of any conflict." It goes on to say "The USFS arbitrarily favors hikers and anglers over floaters. It participates in the helicopter and truck stocking of 70,000 exotic trout for anglers to artificially increase visitation. See AR07557. It builds and maintains trails and campsites for hikers to attract hikers. It allows hiking and fishing anywhere on the Chattooga, at any time of day, on any day of the month all year long, regardless of conditions. In contrast, the USFS has banned floating entirely on the upper Chattooga for seven months of the year. During the months when floating is permitted on certain sections of the upper Chattooga, the USFS has banned floating when flows are below 350 cubic feet per second. It has banned floating entirely on the tributaries and the lower four miles of the Upper Chattooga. The USFS has banned floating solely to offer hikers and anglers "boat-free experiences," a goal unique to the USFS's management on the Upper Chattooga. Nowhere in the record does the USFS bother to explain why it favors hikers and anglers over floaters. Instead, the USFS simply claims that it has the discretion to do so."

The appeal is a 31 page document stating various reasons why the Court should reverse the District Court's granting of Appellees' Motion for Judgment on the Administrative Record and remand to the District Court with instructions to issue the requested declaratory and injunctive relief.

They also state multiple times that there are no conflicts on record between anglers and floaters. In my opinion that is because above Hwy 28 anglers have never had to deal with floaters in their fishing experiences. I guarantee you the first floater caught in the face by a stonefly on the end of a fly fishers' line is going to be mad. That will lead to calling the angler some ugly word, an angler then gets mad because he was just trying to trout fish and didn't do it on purpose; then the rise in the level of conflict depends on how young and big the two individuals are.

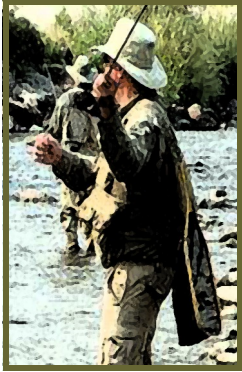

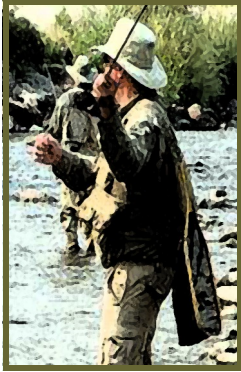
