Stream Improvement Work Day

Was held on Saturday April 12, 2014 on Heddon Creek.

A strong conservation conclave descended upon the Double Bit campground to do good deeds for wild brown trout. This multigenerational gang followed the lead of Forest Service and GADNR fisheries technicians and repaired and built trout habitat improvement structures. A national flag ceremony by the Boy Scouts kicked off the morning.

Volunteers then received a Forest Service safety talk, split into work groups, and hit their designated work stations in and along the creek. Large cover logs were cut and toted, anchoring rebar was pounded thru the logs and into the stream bed, and the structures' rock cribs were refilled. Work crews were refreshed by the dedicated twoscout crew of water boys.

When the work was done at noon, the scouts treated the entire conclave to a hot dog lunch with all the fixins'.

When the day was over everyone left knowing that the hard work they had done would benefit trout for years to come.



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The DH on the Chattooga River has less than a week to go. The catching has been GREAT for so many anglers. Following is a few of their stories.

With Stephanie six weeks from giving birth again and with both of us being pretty worn out from chasing around our 18-month-old Shiloh, we headed to the mountains for a few days to celebrate my twelve research- and review papers being finished as I continue to work on a grad degree. A few friends had been bugging me to put a date on the calendar to get into some dry fly action on The River, and so they planned to camp while my girls and I rented a small cabin on Screamer Mountain.

We arrived on Sunday, but too late to get out on the water. On Monday, however, my friend Daniel Brown from Augusta and I hit the river after being in no hurry to do anything but eat, relax, and eat again. We finally stepped foot in the water at the end of the DNR service road on the Georgia side at about 1:30 or so. There was only a visible rise every five minutes or so, but we quickly learned that that didn't mean that the fish weren't interested in flies floating on the surface. I tied on a size 14 yellow Stimulator with a size 18 yellow soft hackle about three feet behind it and immediately

went 1-for-5! That's right... 20 percent. D tied on a size 14 elk hair caddis with a light cahill parachute trailing behind and also started hooking fish immediately. Both of us continued to miss a lot of fish, though, and we ended up having a bit of a screaming contest, seeing who could produce the most cry-baby holler after missing a strike. Did I mention that we were free to do this because we didn't see a single other person the entire day? You've got to love Mondays and vacation time!

From that point I tried to really focus. I don't get to get on the water much, and it's not like I was ever a great fly angler to begin with, but now I am always really rusty and slow, especially for the first hour or so. A couple of hours later, though, and I had upped my percentage to 13 landed on 20 who rose to my fly. Up to 65 percent! And that included a few chunky browns up to 13 inches and a female brook trout.

Thanks to some good advice from a friend who's usually dredging the bottom, I started skating my Stimulator and soft hackle in faster water and was getting hit by multiple fish almost every time. My percentage again started to plummet... But who cares! I was having a blast! Meanwhile, D, who was just downstream of me, started screaming his head off: "Cannon!! GET DOWN HERE NOW! HURRY!! BEFORE THEY GET OFF!!" "They?" I asked. "I'VE GOT TWO FISH ON!!" D exclaimed. I ran down to him and netted both of his rainbows that he caught on his two dry flies - A first for him and a lot of fun to witness!

After about an hour relaxing on the stone Adirondack chairs at the big campsite on the upper end of the DH, we fished up to Reed Creek, picking off a few here and there, then picked up and wandered back down to the pool at the end of the DNR road to wait for a hopeful "magic hour." I taught D how to skate his flies that afternoon and he was getting slammed over and over and had gotten a lot better just in time for the possible end-of-day madness we were hoping for. The magic hour only lasted about 30 minutes, and I spent a good 10 of those trying to figure out what the heck they were wanting to eat! There were caddis and light cahills and midges flying all around - even a couple of stray yellow sallies - and the fish were rising to all of them. I clipped off and tied on a 16 tan elk hair caddis and a 16 light cahill and started skating. That was the ticket!

By the time it was too dark to see our flies, I finished my count at 25 landed on 47 rises! I haven't had a day like that in a while! D ended up about 12-for-40 as he was practicing his new skating technique. Even though he only landed about a third of the fish that showed interest and I only got about half, there were far more important numbers to the day. They are as follows:

1. 2.1 = Miles of water we had all to ourselves 2. 0 = Number of other people we saw all day 3. 1 = One great day on The River with one good friend 4. 3 = Number of beautiful girls (one still in the womb, of course) I had waiting for me at the cabin only 20 minutes from the DH parking spot 5. 0 = Number of flies I lost that day 6. 0 = Number of seconds I spent worrying about work or school or anything else



The moral of this story is to go on a weekday, and do it now! It is just about at prime time and won't last forever!

On April 26, The Dredger enjoyed some time on the DH. Thought he invited anyone and everyone, he wound up having all the fun himself. He reported "Too bad none of you could join me tonight It was epic on the DH. Fish looked up from when I started (4 pm) til I quit at 8:30. Switch really turned on at 530 and got stuck in the on position til I quit. If anyone has a chance tomorrow, here's my recipe: 16 Cahill emerger 30 inches behind a 16 tan elk hair caddis. The real key is to skitter the duo, usually across or upstream. Very few fish were interested in the dead drift. I had to chum them up. I used5x to caddis and either 5 or 6x to dropper. Six early and give as the sun set and my eyesight weakened. Find the shallows in the shadows and skitter your combo. There is a ton of fish in the dh that await you! Go get 'em Rabunites!!"

On May 2, Prez Pat took off to the River. After a tough week at work, I was ready to get home and relax on a Friday evening. But then I thought, it's that time of year: Dark Thirty time. Since I've waited all year for it.... there's only one thing to do. So I left a note to Tammy on the kitchen counter and headed to "The River".

After a moderate hike into the Upper Backcountry, I was almost to the spot that I wanted to be at. The trail was above the river, and as I paused to look down at a nice pool I saw a trout rise! That was it, I plunged down the bank and started fishing.

It was 7:00 pm and the Light Cahills were really coming off the water. There were also Little Yellow Sallys, Cream Caddis, and the Red Quill Spinner Mayflies all hatching, flying, and laying eggs. As the shadows got on the water, the fish came alive! It was amazing! There were fish chasing emerging bugs, leaping clear of the water catching bugs in flight, and smashing the bugs as they came down to lay eggs.

Man, I love those wild Chattooga brown trout. I caught 4 fish out of the first pool, on both the #14 Parachute Adams and on the trailing #16 Parachute Light Cahill. All fish were 9-11" and fat and healthy.

I eased my way up to the long, slow run that was my original destination. I have good memories of Doug fishing this run. He would stand and watch until he targeted several rising fish, then he would ease out into the river and pick them off, starting with the most downstream fish and working his way upstream. This is where it really sunk into me to "fish like a heron".

Anyway, as I eased up to the run, I saw a nice rising swirl just upstream of a mid-stream rock near the tailout. I cast to it and the fish took my fly. It was a strong, heavy fish that took off upstream like a rocket, putting a big bow in my 3 weight rod. It made a 30 yard run to up under some ledge rocks and broke off my 5x tippet. That would have been my best fish yet this year, he was probably 15-16" at least.

I ended up the day just downstream of a special place some people call The Plug. The action, both insect activity and rising fish,

continued until about 8:30 and then the switch turned off. I don't know, but maybe it turned cool too fast and everything shut down. But for about an hour and a half, it was fast and furious. I ended up with 12 fish landed, all wild brown trout from 9-12", with several long line released.

There were no other cars parked at the bridge, and I saw no other people on the water. It was a good evening, and I'll be back tomorrow night. I plan to take

Notes from the President

IT'S DARK THIRTY TIME AGAIN!

After a long, cool spring we have finally arrived at "Dark Thirty" time again. What is Dark Thirty time, you ask?

It begins in that season of year when the river temperatures are getting up to the mid-60′ s… the long evenings are warm and dry…. and the bugs start hatching off in the evenings. Dark Thirty is the magical time of day when the sun goes down; it is late evening to after dark fishing. It is when the mayfly spinners come down to lay their eggs and the fish come out to feed.

The highlight of the Dark Thirty season is the Green Drake mayfly hatch. These bugs are huge! They are a mouthful for the fish and it is one of the few times of the year here in North Georgia when big brown trout make the mistake to come up to feed on the surface of the water.
