Rabun TU Strategic Plan 2016-2018

Rabun Chapter Trout Unlimited (#522) Strategic Plan - Draft 2016-2018

Mission - To aid in the conservation, protection and restoration of North America's coldwater fisheries and their corresponding watersheds both within our area as well as on a state and national level. Our mission will be achieved by providing services and educational opportunities to a wide range of individuals and or groups such as youth and military veterans. We will also partner with other non-profit and/or public sector organizations in achieving mutually beneficial goals.

Strategy

<u>Conservation</u> - Improve the quality of coldwater fisheries and watersheds within our chapter's area of operation through leadership, advocacy, financial support and stream improvement projects.

Tactics

- 1. Identify existing or potential threats to local rivers/streams and partner with other affected organizations to negate and/or minimize adverse impact.
- 2. Monitor and advocate for/against existing or proposed legislation and/or regulations at both the state and federal level that could impact local watersheds.
- 3. Partner with the Georgia Department of Natural Resources, U.S. Forest Service, U.S. Fish at1d Wildlife Service and other affected agencies and/or organizations on stream restoration and conservation projects.

<u>Service</u> - Work within the local community to provide youth and other targeted groups with the opportunity to experience firsthand the rewards of conservation/restoration efforts as well as the enjoyment of learning to fish for and safeguard our resident trout population.

Tactics

- 1. Continue the chapter's leadership and participation with the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts of America, the Georgia Council's Trout Camp, Project Healing Waters and Casting for Recovery.
- 2. Seek to identify and partner with other affected community groups to provide new avenues of community service.

<u>Education</u> - Strive to increase the awareness of youth and adults regarding the value of and threats to our local watersheds through programs which include fishing and other social events such as cookouts and camping trips.

Tactics

- 1. Continue our chapter's leadership and/or participation in Trout in the Classroom, Georgia Trout Camp, the USFS Tallulah River Kid's Fishing Event, and the Spring Family Cookout.
- 2. Continue to mentor interested youth/adults through the Rabunite 101 training program.
- 3. Continue to provide access to the Trout Unlimited Trout Magazine to appropriate institutions and/or organizations.
- 4. Partner with local educational institutions to organize and support trout fishing clubs.

<u>Membership</u> - Strive to grow the chapter's membership and improve the engagement of new and existing members.

Tactics

- 1. Increase the chapter's membership by 10/0 over the next three years.
- 2. Improve overall member participation by increasing chapter activities separate and apart from the monthly chapter meetings to include periodic member fishing trips, social events and other opportunities for interaction.

<u>Communication</u> - Strive to improve overall communications between chapter leadership, chapter members and the local community.

Tactics

- 1. Enhance the monthly chapter newsletter by increasing the articles or interest and/or photographs submitted by chapter leaders and members.
- 2. Increase the utilization of social media to reach a broader audience. Increase/expand internal communications among/between chapter leaders.
- 3. Continue working to enhance relationships with local media outlets thereby increasing the chapter's visibility.

<u>Collaboration</u> - Focus on enhancing current professional/business relationships with other organizations and/or individuals who can enhance our chapter's overall effectiveness.

Tactics

- 1. Strive to strengthen existing coalitions with the Georgia Council of Trout Unlimited Council, Trout Unlimited National, Boy/Girl Scouts of America, and applicable state and federal agencies.
- 2. Seek to build new coalitions with those whose business interests overlap with our chapter's mission to include fishing retailers, outfitters/fishing guides and other businesses.

<u>Chapter Management</u> - Improve the business practices of the chapter so as to increase efficiency/effectiveness and maximize available funding and manpower.

Tactics

- 1. Improve the overall management of chapter sponsored events through effective planning to include the implementation of checklists and resource utilization.
- 2. Identify and recruit future chapter officers and event chairs.
- 3. Seek to obtain input/volunteers from a broader spectrum of chapter members.





The annual Tallulah River kids fishing rodeo was held on June 4, 2016. All the volunteers hosted over 150 kids for the event.




Betty Creek Clean up for Trout Camp

TROUT CAMP 2016

This year the number of graduates from Trout Camp went over the "300" mark. As we closed up our thirteenth camp, we reflected on all the years and realized that some of our graduates are approaching 30 years old and some of our campers this year weren't even born when we held our first camp. Time flies and it goes faster each day!!

The weather was as good as it gets with cool mornings, mild afternoons and no rain. However, we need rain so now that camp is over...bring it on!! The campers all seemed focused on what they were learning and picked up the skills quickly. The trout cooperated and, by the second day, every camper had caught a fish. We didn't break a single rod this year and only one person got hooked and that was a mentor so it doesn't really count. We had a happy, bright bunch of young folks who were interested in fly fishing and also in TU's mission with clean, cold water. This year we enjoyed a visit from Tara Granke, Headwaters Youth Program Coordinator, who spent a day interacting with the campers and

staff. Her enthusiasm and good nature were a boost to all and we hope she'll return often. About two-thirds of the chapters in Georgia sent volunteers to mentor the campers. That wide spread support has been the strength of our camp from the beginning. We even had three college-age mentors, along with our four "Young Mentors," who added much to the camp and bodes well for the future. Those guys sure have more energy than some of the rest of us. As always our agency partners, Georgia DNR and the Forest Service, supported our activities and helped the youngsters understand more about the fish and the importance of the quality of



their habitat. Our campers always enjoy the day of toting logs, shoveling rock and driving re-bar. And...their efforts make a difference in a stream.

We would also like to thank Rabun Gap-Nachoochee School for allowing us to use their wonderful facility for these 13 years, and that includes great food and a trout stream on campus!

His first point: During the heat of summer, head for the smaller streams at higher elevations. Next, stealth is important. He then proceeded to explain his reasons for using a shorter (under 7'6") fly rod,



by explaining the four kinds of casts most appropriate for small streams and tight areas. Jake then shared his selection of flies- all in one fly box, maybe a total of a dozen flies! Finally, he explained his reasoning for using 3X tippet instead of 5 or 6X, and also discussed leader length. All this was followed by lots of questions, and now we are all ready to hike into GSMNP! Great presentation and a big THANK YOU to Jake. A Broderick Crawford rainbow trout print was presented to Jake by Chapter President Steve.

Our regular meeting raffle was held and raised over \$65.00 with donations from June Landreth, Mack Martin (Atlanta Fly Fishing School), and the grand prize was Justin English' donation of two dozen fresh eggs! Thanks to all who contributed, and to all who participated.

The advantage of low water creates hydrologic conditions that allows for high sampling efficiency, which is what DNR always hopes for. Sampling covered just one hundred yards of the total river length in Georgia. The sampling this year will add to the river monitoring database that keeps creating long term benefits for the Chattooga River.

COLLINS PROTECTS NORTHEAST GEORGIA ECONOMY FROM OBAMA ADMINISTRATION PROPOSAL

(From Sky 96.3 News Room)

The House of Representatives passed the Department of Interior, Environment, and Related Agencies Appropriations bill for Fiscal Year 2017, which funds the Department of the Interior and its related projects and agencies for the coming year. Congressman Collins worked to have language included in the bill that prohibits any funds from being used to close any United States Fish and Wildlife Service fish hatchery, or to reduce production at those hatcheries. The following statement was issued by Congressman Collins on the victory for fish hatchery programs that draw economic activity to rural places around the country, especially Northeast Georgia:

"Under the Obama Administration, hatchery programs—including the Chattahoochee National Fish Hatchery, have been among the lowest funding priorities. The Chattahoochee National Fish Hatchery is a major economic driver in the mountain town of Suches, Georgia and the surrounding area. Because of its critical importance to Northeast Georgia, I fought for the inclusion of this language to ensure the continued viability of the Chattahoochee National Fish Hatchery and other hatcheries across the country. The language in the bill rejects the Administration's proposal to close certain hatcheries, and prohibits production from being slowed or stopped. I know what an important investment these hatcheries are – the hatchery in Fannin County has generated millions in economic output for the area, and has a \$40 dollar return on investment for every dollar spent. In addition to drawing anglers from all over the country to bring economic activity to a rural place, the hatchery keeps the river responsibly stocked with enough trout to keep the habitat in order and maintain ecological balance. I thank my colleagues who have been supportive of this measure, and I am glad to see that the bill will preserve the economic, educational, and recreational benefits that come along with them."

Georgia TU State Council recently made a donation to the Smithgall Woods Education program. Various chapter members participated in this years Tie One On at Bass Pro Shop to make this donation possible.
