We are gearing up for a great big celebration!! We hope you will be able to join us for our 30th annual Rabun Rendezvous. It will be a great time! Our guest speaker will be Beverly Smith, Vice President for Volunteer Operations, TU National. Beverly is responsible for the Volunteer Operations Department which supports 36 state councils and 380 local chapters across the country by delivering a suite of applications, trainings and resources aimed at helping volunteers more easily and effectively accomplish TU's mission in their local communities. Her responsibilities also include managing TU's youth education programs, veterans' services partnership, and women/ diversity initiative. Beverly joined TU as the Volunteer Operations Coordinator in 2007, was promoted to Director in 2009, and Vice President in 2014. Prior to joining TU, Beverly worked for the Jackson Hole Conservation Alliance and the South Carolina Coastal Conservation League. Beverly grew up in Charleston, S.C. and received a B.A. from the University of Virginia. She lives in Jackson, Wyo. with her husband, daughter and springer spaniel where she enjoys volunteering locally, fly fishing and bird hunting.

We'll be at our usual location at the Dillard House. Social will start at 5 o'clock PM. Folks will start gathering to "pick the pig" and enjoy the rocking chairs on the porch of the Conference Center. There will be snack trays of cheeses, crackers, veggies with dips and fruits. Back Casting

Once again, a full house of mature Rabunites and young boy scouts packed our meeting room for the September meeting on Tuesday September 20th. The program was by USFS biologist David Vinson. A proud grad of Rabun County High and the Warnell Forestry School at UGA, David's first fishing memories were made while hauling in rainbows at Andy's Trout Farm! He truly has Rabunite blood flowing thru his veins.

A sixteen year agency veteran who worked his way up the ranks, thru the recreation and fire programs, David landed his dream job when



he replaced the legendary wildlife technician, Doug Watson, upon his retirement. Two years ago David was promoted to biologist.

With recent reorganization, senior biologist Jim Wentworth, David, and a new wildlife technician will now cover both the central (Blairsville) and east (Clayton) ranger districts. They are stretched thinner, but remain highly committed to fish and wildlife habitat management.

David then listed past, present, and possible future fisheries accomplishments. He reminded us of Chattooga sampling and copter stocking, trout stream habitat improvements, GATU Trout Camp support, and our cooperative smile production via the annual Tallulah River kids fishing rodeo. He showed us photos of the tallulah's wheelchair-accessible fishing pier, now under construction, and needing some Rabunite TLC in the near future.

David was excited about continuing habitat improvements in the Warwoman watershed project's streams. He also strongly encouraged TU participation in the new Foothills Landscape project. For more info click <u>here</u> and be sure to attend the Clayton meeting on Oct. 18, 2016 at the Civic Center.

His agency has just begun taking public comments on USFS management priorities in this 160,000 acre area, so Rabunites oughta discuss and speak up soon on the Foothills Project.

It was a great meeting with a local boy who has "dun good" professionally and is ready, willing, and able to work in partnership with DNR and the Rabunites. Let's take advantage of this golden opportunity to help David optimize trout habitat for all of us. Shoot, with David here, the fishing might soon be better than a day at Andy's Trout Farm!

Thanks for coming, David. We're glad to have ya!

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

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Fishing Reports

The Perry's(Steve & Elizabeth) just returned from a two week vacation in Montana and

Wyoming, in celebration of my birthday(not telling which one). This is the first time we have ever said, when time to come home. we don't want to leave. After arriving in Bozeman, we headed for Columbia Falls, MT, near the west entrance to Glacier National Park. If you haven't been to GNP, go! Every view is spectacular. First day was wast to east on The Road to the Sun, and next day was east to west. It was amazing how so many things were different going in each direction.

After leaving the Glacier area, we headed south through Idaho into Wyoming, and Jackson

Wyoming, and Jackson Hole. Haven't been there since I was with son, Ryan, who was guiding for Jack Dennis Outfitters, during 9/11. Following a brief stay in Jackson, we saw the Tetons on the way to Cody, WY. If you have never been to the Buffalo Bill Museum in Cody, it is a must. I could have remained in that building for days. Each wing is different: A celebration of Buffalo Bill's life; art work, including a replica of Remington's work shop and statuary; the Natural History section; and finally, the history of guns. I have never seen so many weapons in one place in my life, not even in VietNam.

From Cody, we headed to Paradise Valley, fifteen miles south of Livingston, MT, where we were joined by the children and grandkids who were able to be there. And the fishing began!!! They were slowly opening the Yellowstone after the whitefish kill, so we were able to fish that a couple times. Beautiful cutthroat and rainbows. We also fished Mill Creek for cutthroat, and had the privilege of fishing the private water on the DuPuy. The DuPuy is the hardest fishing I have ever done, but the few fish caught were very high quality.

While in Paradise Valley, we ventured into Yellowstone National Park, and, as Mother Nature would have it,



IT SNOWED!! Day one was almost blizzard conditions. Day two was limited because roads were closed because of snow. Oh well, back to fishing! Finally, we travelled up into a basin for about nine miles where there is a huge field of caraway to watch the grizzly bears gorging for winter. OMG!

All in all, it was a great tripgood time together, a great time with the kids, and lots of critters

seen. Didn't want to come home, but it is always good to get back. We WILL do this again.

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Fishing Reports

Taking the Treatment, 2016 By Doug Adams and Pat Hopton

Back in 1957, Doug made his first western fishing trip. On that trip he became afflicted with a condition known as "Rocky Mountain Fever". Then in 1986 he invited Pat on his first western fishing trip, where he too became afflicted with the Fever. Now, every year the two must return to the high mountains to seek relief with some cold water therapy.

This year, Pat and Doug made a 10 day trip (4 days driving and 6 days fishing) to a spot well known to many Rabunites... an abandoned FS campground on the banks of a mid-size river, a spot where you can fish just outside your camp or where you can hike into the backcountry upstream from camp.

There, we were greeted with daily morning hatches of Trico mayflies. What fun! Sight casting to rising large trout in low, clear waters using #20 spent wing dry flies. By 11:00 am the Trico spinner fall was over and we spent the rest of the day exploring the pocket water with Elk Hair Caddis and Copper Johns. Many beautiful, wild rainbow and brown trout were caught in the 14-18" range.


We completed our treatment by enjoying the sounds of coyote howling at night, smelling the sage, watching eagles and ospreys over the river, tasting fresh caught fish cooked on the grill, and sitting around the campfire sharing memories, stories, and laughs. The treatment was complete though admittedly it will be temporary. We know there is no permanent cure for Rocky Mountain Fever. But the memories will hold us until the next treatment.





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
