# FISHING REPORTS

By: Michele Crawford - This fishing story is a little different. Instead of being about catching the fish, it's about stocking the fish. I'm talking about flying fish. Not the kind in the ocean, but the traveling trout from the Lake Burton fish hatchery. Last fall I had the honor to distantly observe the stocking of the Chattooga River for the Delayed Harvest season. I was wanting to show my fellow TU members some of their donation dollars at work. Donation dollars that they technically received back when they went fishing on the DH and had one great time after another. So since I had loooonnnng camera lenses I was allowed to photograph the men and women at work that day stocking the trout to document and share with our readers. So following is my experience from that day to share. Keep in mind, my regular job is in retail behind a counter most of the time. For the men and women there that day they were just doing their job, but to me I thought they all rocked!! What cool jobs they have in my opinion! If I put this story into a video, the only song I can think of that would go with what I witnessed would be "Bad to the Bone".

It was early and chilly that day. Not too cold, just damp and cloudy. When I arrived all the employees from Georgia DNR and the US Forest Service were in a holding pattern, waiting to see if the clouds lifted enough for the ship (helicopter) to fly. While we waited, the agencies reviewed maps and discussed showing the first time pilot for this stocking the dropping points in the Chattooga. About an hour later the fuel truck showed up. "That's a good sign" I was told. Sure enough, it wasn't long we heard the chopper coming in from Clayton over the mountains. As the



bird come in he landed ever so gently, then he and his crew came over for the safety briefing. The pilot was young looking and he perhaps knew the

reservations some might have about him having never worked with this group before. As he approached the staging area he joked that he wasn't that familiar with that kind of helicopter so if anyone had any tips he would appreciate it. Yes, we all laughed. Apparently working

with long lines on a helicopter takes a lot of talent and experience. Any

apprehension anyone had on this pilot was soon to be put to rest. He was super talented working with long lines. Experience he had gained working with a helicopter in the logging business in south GA.



The pilot would hover over the river with the large orange "Bambi" firefighting bucket then dip it in to fill it up with water. From there he would lift up and over the trees into the field where the group was ready to fill up the bucket with trout. Using a large pipe, they would open up a compartment in the stocking truck for the fish to slide down into a big plastic trash can filled with holes. (Continued on next page)

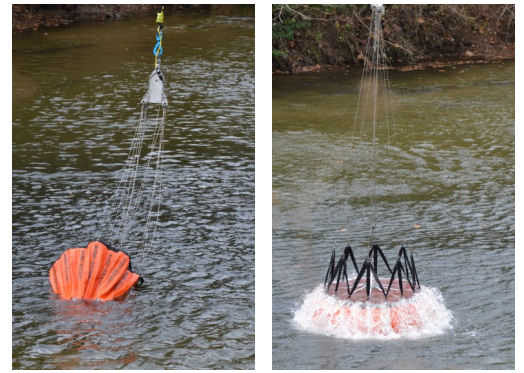




# FISHING REPORTS

The holes in the bucket drained the water from the holding tanks while the trout were transferred into the big bambi bucket. Once the bucket filled with trout, the long tether line was straightened out for lift off. The pilot would slowly lift, after having cleared the trees he took off up the river with each full bucket of trout. On this particular day he made 10 trips up the Chattooga River.

To see all that's involved you would think it would take all day. But once the ship got started, the experience and expertise of the crew on the ground had thousands of trout swimming in the Chattooga River in just a few hours. To say what I watched was impressive would be an understatement.



Each time you fish the Chattooga DH remember the work and man hours that go into stocking the river. The South Carolina side did the same thing one week before Georgia. Different agencies participate and contribute funds to make this happen every year. For those who support Rabun TU we spend a portion of our funds to help make this event possible. Enjoy the fishing this spring, and give a big Thanks to GADNR and the US Forest Service when you see them!! Based on what I saw being stocked in that river, everyone should be able to hear many WHHAAAAaaaaaaaaaaaaa WHOOoooooooooooooooooooo's being shouted from the river banks this fishing season!

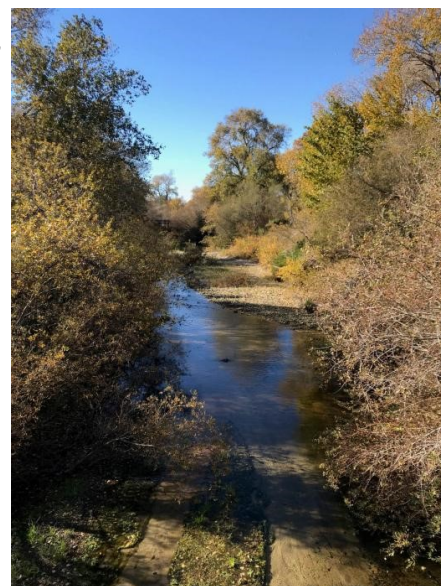
