



Scoring Falls: The Rabunite Method

To add to your enjoyment of a day on the stream with a fishing companion, you can "score" each other's falls (note: a lone angler is neither capable nor qualified to score his own falls). Falls are scored on a scale of 1 to 10 points. The angler with the lowest total score at the end of the day wins. So even if you are ahead in points towards the end of a day, don't give up hope. Some of the highest scores are earned when an angler attempts to exit the stream after dark. I know — I've done it many times.

A note from Tammy to Doug on scoring Pat's fall:

I meant to add more information regarding Pat's fall while fighting a fish on "Butt Creek". The final grade for his dip is a 5. It starts with 5 points, he went up to his neck on one side. He did a double dip, so add a point, 6. He had a whopper of a trout on line, so that is another point, making it 7. He landed the trout so subtract 2 points making it a solid 5 points on the Fall Scale. At least that is the way I saw it.....

From Doug back to Tammy:

The way you saw it - - - - is what counts.

Most of you have known of or have seen Lefty Kreh during his lifetime. Lefty passed away in March of this year after many years of teaching many aspects of the sport of fly fishing. His doctor was Mark Lamos and he is attempting to preserve Lefty's legacy and has been named as the executor of his estate. An overview of this effort is available by <u>CLICKING</u><u>HERE</u>.

Light Cahill

Hook: #10 or 12 Dry Fly Hook Tail: White / Cream Hackle Fibers Body: White / Cream Fine Dubbing Wing: Wood Duck Feathers Thorax: White / Cream Hackle Fibers



A great fly to have in your box during the month of May. Have some smaller sizes for early May, then larger sizes for later in the month. Remember: don't leave the stream too early—these are great for "dark thirty" fishing!

Here's some fresh intel. I went to tooga dh last nite to test high water fishability. I had to be careful as I entered at 630, but found some spots where the water wasn't ripping. Size 18

cahills cane off in fair numbers around 730. Enough fish looked up to keep it interesting. Fish were picky and I had three refusals or burndums for each fondle. Twitched emergers worked best. One brown had a good set of shoulders on him. Also saw a few big cahills and even a stray Green Drake. Be careful wading. Find the soft spots and watch for risers. For Dark30, carry cahills and Caddis and antciptate the yellow stuff: sallies and stimulators.

From Brian Weeks, April 24


Early last week, when most everywhere else was blown out, I headed up to Smith Creek to see how things looked there. The water was high, fast, and turbid, but not as much as I've seen it in the past. The water temped out at 58F. Rigged with a couple of bigger, brighter nymphs, the second cast brought this rainbow to hand. He came from the slower water behind the bush against the left bank - water too low to hold fish at normal flows. The second rainbow came from the slower water behind the tree in the middle of the stream. In normal flows, this water is about an inch deep. Every fish came from the slowest water I could find. Half the time it was against the bank, the other half it was in the slowest stretches of riffles. But even those slower riffles were still pretty fast - fast enough to make a nine incher feel like a big 'un!
