Georgia Outdoor Stewardship Amendment

The Georgia Outdoor Stewardship Amendment is on the ballot on November 6 as Amendment One. This is the first time Georgians have had a chance to dedicate funding for conservation and it can be done without a tax increase.

The amendment will allow up to 80% of the existing sales and use tax on outdoor sporting goods to the protection of the state's land, water and wildlife with no new taxes or fees. Over \$20 million would be dedicated every year for the next ten years.

This funding could not be used for any other purpose and would be subject to strict accountability provisions and public disclosure. Only projects consistent with the state's established goals for conservation would be approved.

If passed, this funding would:

- Protect lands critical to clean drinking water and the quality of Georgia's lakes, rivers and streams;
- Acquire and improve parks and trails;
- Maintain and improve access to wildlife management areas and create opportuni ties for hunting and fishing; and
- Support Georgia's \$27 billion outdoor recreation industry.

The Georgia Outdoor Stewardship Amendment is supported by a coalition of leading conservation organizations including The Conservation Fund, Georgia Conservancy, Georgia Wildlife Federation, The Nature Conservancy, Park Pride, and The Trust for Public Land.

Rabun Resident Elected to Chair State Council of Trout Unlimited

In the recent annual leadership election for Trout Unlimited, Dr. Kathy Breithaupt of Rabun County was elected as the Council Chair for Georgia Trout Unlimited.

Dr. Breithaupt has been an active member of the Rabun Chapter of Trout Unlimited and currently acts as secretary of the chapter. Previously she was secretary for the Georgia Council and, more recently, held the position as Vice-Chair. In addition, she is the founding Coordinator for the Georgia Trout Camp, a week-long camp for boys and girls from all over Georgia and other states that has operated for the past fifteen years.

The Georgia Council is the umbrella organization for all twelve chapters of Trout Unlimited in Georgia. The Council supports all chapters with their 4000 members and coordinates efforts to meet the mission of protecting and restoring cold, clean water in Georgia and throughout our country.

Dr. Breithaupt is the first female to chair the State Council and one of just a very few nationwide to hold this position. Trout Unlimited is a national conservation organization founded in 1959 that now boast over 150,000 members throughout the country.

Campsite #93 in the "Wooded Loop" will be the official gathering site. Campsites fill up fast this time of year, so don't delay in making your campsite reservations (see below).



An early fall fishing report submitted by Tammy Hopton: September 22, 2018


The first fall weekend, Pat and I and a couple of friends traveled north of Clayton for an afternoon of fishing. I decided to fish a smaller stream and let the guys take on the larger waters. So, Patrick gave me a lift to a tributary stream about a mile away and dropped me off.

It was a pretty, warm afternoon but the creek was nicely covered in shadow. I started at the first pretty pool (pictured below) close to my drop off point and floated a Parachute Adams down it with no takers. I go upstream for about 3 more deep runs and I give the fish more opportunity but only a few came up and hit my fly. I was not quick enough to snag any. So... 3-4 bites without success. Dang!

I remember that before I left Pat our friend had said something about a worm working this time of year. So, I changed my fly to a pink San Juan worm and, using my normal fly cast, I let the worm barely sink down into a deep hole at the edge of a pyramid-shaped rock. At the bottom of the hole, finally success! I net a pretty rainbow trout about 8 inches. Finally, I am getting somewhere.

Then I get 2 very small rainbows and I think, I have gotten all I can in that one spot but then I realize I have not really given the middle of the run much attention. So I cast to a little different line of water. That's when I get a strike and I am off! I am traveling downstream with a big fish showing me the way! I finally net him almost back where we started. A very pretty rainbow about 13".

In the middle of running up and down the creek, I lost my sole of my boot, so I take several minutes to change into sandals. (I knew it was coming. The felt sole was coming unglued and I had put a pair of sandals in my vest just in case). After changing shoes and letting the run calm down some, I think, huh.... maybe one more time.

So, in the same run with the pyramid-shaped rock in it, I put my little pink worm up at the top of the hole this time and let it sink for 2-3 floats. And then another strike! I was hooked into another fish that travels upstream, then down to the pool below the rock pool. He is not as pretty as the first big rainbow but still healthy and fat. Whew!

Okay, enough for that run, I go upstream to the next pool and see a seam that looks too shallow but I try it anyway thinking no way a fish will be in that shallow of water ... but again, another big rainbow, about 14"! What a day!

I keep fishing after that but only get snagged in trees. I walk out and meet back up with all my friends to hear their tall tales. I told them about my day, but I don't think they believed me. That's OK, because I've got the pictures and the memories. As someone once said... "you don't have to believe it if you don't want!"

It was a beautiful day, on a clear cold creek, without another soul in sight! What fun!!





Editors Note:


For some reason—who knows why? - during this time of year when the leaves are just starting to fall, a pink or red San Juan Worm fished without weight is deadly! Treat your tippet with floatant and let the worm either float on the surface or just slightly sink. Also try trailing it behind an Orange Stimulator.

Try it! Tammy's report is proof that it works!

I strongly encourage you to vote Yes to Amendment 1.
