Dear Ed, Mike, Chad, and Ryan:

On behalf of our 185 members, the Excom and Directors of the Rabun Chapter of Trout Unlimited (RTU) would like to thank you for your commitment to the longstanding helicopter trout stocking program on the Chattooga River. First, we appreciated Chad's diligence with identifying a potential \$10,000 grant to help fund this program in future years. He then helped the Georgia Trout Unlimited (GATU) State Council through the lengthy and complicated federal grants process to secure these funds. As assistants of and cheerleaders for Chairwoman Kathy Breithaupt and her GATU council, RTU was elated about the grant.

Then, when your FY20 deadlines prevented the use of these grant funds, your CONF quartet fully funded and implemented the fall 2020 helicopter stocking program for Georgia's share of the Chattooga backcountry trout. When combined with the other half of the stocking by South Carolina DNR and Francis Marion/Sumter NF, the river achieved 100% of its annual backcountry stocking goal! In this truly challenging year of tight budgets, record western fires, and Covid, the accomplishment of this fisheries program goal is commendable. So we are commending you!

Thank you for preserving the Chattooga helicopter stocking program and maintaining the popular recreational fishery over fifteen miles of river backcountry. We look forward to partnering with your agency in maintaining this important component of the CONF fish and wildlife management program for years to come. We are 100% behind you on topics of mutual interest, so please do not hesitate to contact us on coldwater resource conservation and management across our national forest. Fishing Reports

Happy new year! It started out wet, so that was a good time for fly-tying and online shopping. Trout streams were warmer than normal, but running very high from 2.5 inches of rain. They were also crowded with holiday anglers, so individual catch totals were smaller due to competition for good spots and the cold water between the two holidays.

Fishing conditions should improve as flows subside and holiday crowds disperse. The key will be water temperatures. Anything over 45 and you'll have decent chance. Under that and your winter pickings will be slim.

Best winter trout bugs should continue to be egg patterns, rubberleg stones, pheasant tail nymphs and soft hackle wets, and small Euronymphs (perdigons were hot).

Hint: match flies to flows! Use bigger and brighter bugs when rivers are running fast and fish must make quick lunch decisions. Scale down to smaller, natural colored flies as flows subside and your quarry can study your offerings. Hit that 11AM-4PM window of sunshine and daily water temp peaks for your highest fondling probability.
