Trip Reports


Lewis Reeves III, Jeff Reeves, and Trey McFalls—Wyoming

Soft Hackle Pheasant Tail

HOOK: Nymph Fly Hook #12-16

TAIL: 5-6 Pheasant Tail Fibers

BODY: Pheasant Tail Fibers

THORAX: Peacock Herl

HACKLE: Partridge Or Similar Soft Hackle



This is a great fly to use as a dropper, with a Stimulator as the lead fly and strike indicator!
