GA Delayed Harvest Trout Fishing Streams: Open Nov. 1

Are you ready to Go TROUT Fish Georgia? Beautiful weather and fantastic scenery await you in the northern part of the state, and beginning in November, trout fishing on Georgia's delayed harvest trout streams will be in full swing, according to the Georgia Department of Natural Resources' Wildlife Resources Division (WRD).

While trout fishing can be found year-round in Georgia, there are five trout streams that are seasonally managed under special regulations called Delayed Harvest (DH) to increase angler success. These streams have catch-and-release regulations from November 1-May 14 and are stocked monthly by WRD and other partner agencies like the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and South Carolina DNR. This combination of stocking and catch/release allows for good trout catch rates and high angler satisfaction.

This year, four delayed harvest streams will be stocked with trout. These streams include:

- Toccoa River located on U.S. Forest Service land upstream of Lake Blue Ridge in Fannin County (from 0.4 miles above Shallowford Bridge to 450 feet above the Sandy Bottom Canoe Access).
- Amicalola Creek on the Dawson Forest Wildlife Management Area (from Steele Bridge Road downstream to Georgia Hwy. 53).
- Smith Creek downstream of Unicoi Lake (Unicoi State Park).
- A portion of the **Chattooga River** (from Ga. Hwy. 28 upstream to the mouth of Reed Creek) on U.S. Forest Service land bordering South Carolina.

Georgia Trout Stocking Coordinator John Lee Thomson commented, "In an effort to provide excellent opportunities at the other DH sections, and due to current low trout inventories, anglers should note that stocking the delayed harvest section of the Chattahoochee River below the Morgan Falls dam will not be able to take place this year."

Between November 1 - May 14, anglers on all traditional delayed harvest streams are restricted to single hook, artificial lures. Beginning May 15, the general regulations to designated trout waters then apply to those streams.

Report on Rabun Chapter Meeting, October

Approximately 15 Chapter members and guests met for the October Chapter meeting. Pat Hopton gave a presentation on "Brown Trout in the Chattooga River". He discussed the two different colorations of brown trout found in the upper Chattooga River. These two colorations are commonly known as the 'Old Timey Original" brown trout and the "Walhalla" brown trout. If you have fished the Chattooga River very much you will recognize these two distinct colorations:



Walhalla Brown has many black spots, few orange and red spots. No halo around spots.



Old Timey Original has fewer black spots, orange and red spots along and below lateral line. Has halo around spots.

Being fairly new to fly fishing, years ago my husband Pat gave me instructions on fly casting. Later, I got more instructions from my dear friend, Doug Adams. Even though I kept trying I could never get my fly to go where I wanted it to go.

I have watched others with envy as they were able to skillfully place the fly right into the sweet spot on the river, with the reward of landing a big brown. That's what I wanted! Obviously, it was time to get serious about learning how to cast a fly. I needed help from the professionals.

So I snagged (pun intended) a place in a Fly Casting Class at the <u>Atlanta Fly Fishing School</u> in late October. I was lucky—it was the last class scheduled for 2022. It was there that our Chapter friend and AFS owner Mack Martin along with casting instructor Tom Rueping did their best to help me out. Tom and Mack, as well as three other instructors at the school are certified Master Fly Casting Instructors by the International Federation of Fly Fishers. They have a wealth of knowledge.

We started in the classroom with learning the key parts of a cast. Then we headed outside for some hands on instruction. We learned the roll cast and overhead cast. We practiced making adjustments for wind and terrain. Tom critiqued my cast and help me to change some bad habits as well as giving pointers for how to practice in the future.

I learned so much! But not only that it was a lot of fun. All the staff were professional, skilled and made me feel at home. Class size was small and personal and the setting was perfect! Thank you Mack and Tom as well all the other staff at Atlanta Fly Fishing School!

If, like me, you need a little help with your fly casting, consider a class at the <u>Atlanta Fly Fishing School</u>. I highly recommend them.


