On Saturday, March 25th, which was National Stream Cleanup Day, 16 Rabun TU Chapter volunteers were led by Mason English (Assistant Conservation Team Leader Justin English's son) on a Stream Cleanup Project. Trash and litter pickup was conducted in two locations: along the Earls Ford Road to Warwoman Creek and at the Hwy 28 bridge of the Chattooga River.

We gathered at Hatch Camp and Art Farm (thank you Scott Low) at 8:30 AM, split into two groups to go to both locations consecutively, and were done by 10:30 AM, in plenty of time to go home, shower, take a nap, and get ready to go to Hoot-on-the-Hooch.

We picked up trash stream-side, along the road, in the bushes, and at campsites. Our total collection was twenty 30 gallon full trash bags and one downspout! Many thanks to all our volunteers for our first successful Conservation Team project for 2023.

Our next team project is a Stream Improvement project scheduled for April 27th during our Annual Spring Campout. We will be working at the Reed Creek/Hedden Creek areas constructing new stream structures and improving existing structure structures. Please mark your calendars to volunteer if your schedule permits.

Rabun Chapter 2023 Spring Campout

When: Wednesday, April 26 through Sunday, April 30. Please note the change of date from previous Spring Campouts.

Where: Oconee State Park, Mountain Rest, SC

Who: All Chapter members and guests are invited!

Details: The Chapter will use Site #91 in the Wooded Loop as the "gathering spot". Meals will be taken there along with story telling around the campfire at night.



Campers should contact the <u>Park</u> and make their own campsite reservations. There are a variety of sites available, including sites with full hookups.

We will eat breakfast and supper together at Site #91. Lunch is on your own. We need volunteers to cook suppers and breakfasts beginning Wednesday April 26 through Sunday April 30 (except Friday supper).

If you volunteer to cook a meal then all other meals are free of charge to you. If you do not cook a meal, then you pay the cook \$5.00 for each meal that you eat. What a deal! The Chapter will provide stoves, paper plates, silverware, cups. Even if you don't camp, come by to eat a meal or sit around the campfire!

Friday night will be a communal steak and baked potato supper. Everyone bring your own steak and potato. The Chapter will have the grill and hot charcoal ready for you to grill your own steak!

We need an accurate head count of who will be at the campout and what meals you will eat. This is needed for the cooks to adequately purchase and prepare the meals.

On Thursday, April 27 we will travel to Upper Reed Creek and perform a stream conservation project in support of the US Forest Service and GA Department of Natural Resources.

For other activities during the campout you may explore the Park, hike to nearby scenic waterfalls, photograph spring wildflowers, visit nearby Cashiers, NC, or fish the many streams in the Tri-State area. Remember to carry the appropriate State fishing license!

Call for Volunteers!

Please come join the Rabun Chapter on Thursday, April 27 for a stream conservation project. We will be working under the supervision of the US Forest Service and GA Department of Natural Resources to construct new stream structures and perform maintenance on existing stream structures in Reed and Heddon Creeks. We will meet at 8:30 am at the "Double Bit" dispersed camping area, located alongside Reed Creek just off the Burrells Ford Road.

Directions to the work project:

- From Clayton, GA take Warwoman Road (next to Ingles) approximately 13 miles to the intersection with GA Hwy 28.
- Turn right onto GA Hwy 28 and go approximately 1.7 to Burrells Ford Road (FS Road 646) on your left.
- Turn left onto Burrells Ford Road. This road is a fairly well-maintained gravel road. Go approximately 5 miles to a woods road on your left. This road will be marked with a TU sign.
- Turn left onto this woods road and go 100 yards to the parking area. This woods road is rough and there is a shallow ford in the road. You may also park on the Burrells Ford Road and walk to the work project along the woods road.

HOOK: # 12-18 Dry Fly Hook TAIL: Brown Hackle Fibers

BODY: Grey Dubbing

PARACHUTE: Antron or Calf Tail HACKLE: Grizzly / Brown Mix



A great all-around fly to use during the Spring, it imitates many varieties of mayflies. Try attaching a small nymph as a dropper.
