


















#### Do You Know of a Youth That Wants to go to Trout Camp?

## Snake River 2023 and Rabun Reminiscing, submitted by Don "Broken Knee" Atkinson

You may have heard the story of the Dual Blue Leaf Stake plant? That's quite a story and either Jim or Tom Nixon could probably tell it also. It involves Rick, me, Adams, Nixon, and several others. Early one morning some biologist (Editors note: it was Ben Sanders, biologist for the USFS.) came wandering into camp looking for an unusual plant he had heard was in the area. (Ed note again: the plant he was looking for was the small-whorled pogonia). Now none of us knew what he was talking about or where that plant was located, but Jim Nixon immediately saw an opportunity to play a joke. He said that he knew of another, very rare plant, growing in the area. In fact, it was so rare that only the old time mountain folks knew about it. It was called the Dual Blue Leaf Stake plant. The biologist got really excited because this was a new one to him and he begged Jim to take him to see those plants. So off they went, far up the steep mountainside, through rhododendron thickets over rock cliffs, back and forth, until finally coming up on the elusive plant!

Well, they were wooden stakes pounded into the ground, with blue plastic surveyors tape tied around them! Obviously something done by the Forest Service in an earlier time, for who knows what purpose? As you can expect, the biologist was quite embarrassed for having fallen for the joke and we all had a good laugh at his expense.

But Ben Sanders could take a joke and became a good friend of the Rabunites. He often made it a point to come to the Klondike campouts in later years. And for years afterward he never missed a chance to tell the story of the elusive Dual Blue Leaf Stake plant, found only in the wilds of Rabun County. There was a large contingent of Rabunites at his <u>funeral in</u> 2009.

I have right behind me in my home office an original specimen of the Dual Blue Leaf Stake

plant. The plant is located inside the burned out sycamore stump underneath my first ever steelhead that I caught in Michigan many years ago.

Oh, how many stories there are! Wahoo!! Is that the way you say it? Adams always accused me of not being able to yell that because he said Yankees can't yell like that. He may be right.

Thanks to you and Tammy and others for passing it forward and keeping the memories alive. We can't see around the bend. But occasionally I think I hear a few rapids downriver.
