Report of the "2024 Mack Martin Rod Sweepstakes" By Ray King, Fundraising Chairperson

On behalf of the Rabun TU Chapter, special thanks are awarded to Mack Martin, Atlanta Fly Fishing School, for his donation of a fly rod and fly reel. Mack has once again graciously donated a custom-built WINSTON AIR-2 BORON-Graphite 9', 4-weight, 4-piece fly rod, rod sock and Carbon-Fiber rod tube and a TFO NTR fly reel with Wulff TT 4-Weight Line with 100 yards 20-lb Backing to the Rabun TU Chapter for our annual fundraiser.

A Call for Volunteers! From Tammy Hopton, Chapter Prez

Did you also know the Rabun Chapter leadership sent a proposal to the local Forest Service agency over a year ago asking for action to be taken to improve our beloved Reed Creek watershed? It took several months for a more formal response due to changes in the Forest Service personnel, but earlier in the summer we had the opportunity to sit and discuss our requests with Towdy Tipton, David Vinson, and Brod Logan of the USFS and Leon Brotherton of GDNR.

Our concern with the Reed Creek Watershed is sedimentation getting into the creek. Of course, the biggest contributor to this sedimentation is the Burrells Ford Road. They are fully aware of this issue. We are too and will continue to remind the USFS of the road issues.

Another area of concern is the Double Bit campsites. These are three dispersed camping areas along the Hedden and Ridley Creeks. If you don't know, this is the birthplace of our chapter. It was during a campout that Doug Adams made the proposal to a group of his fishing buddies to form a chapter of Trout Unlimited to help protect the Chattooga River.

In the past, campers have left trash, painted rocks and drove their vehicles down close to the banks of Ridley and Hedden while camping at Double Bit. This has resulted in sedimentation going into those streams. The Forest Service has tried to remedy this by blocking off access into lower and upper Double Bit campsites with large rocks. Unfortunately, these rocks were moved and trees were chopped down in the lower Double Bit area in order to regain access closer into the campsite and closer to the creek banks. The result was more mud getting into Ridley and Hedden. The Forest service has considered several options to protect this area including closing the road into the campsites.

In our proposal, we asked permission for the Rabun Chapter to clean and monitor those campsites once a month for eight months out of the year, March through October. The idea is to keep the areas clean and just observe and report any changes in the campsites or vandalism. Hopefully we can improve the streams by keeping trash out of the creeks and preventing erosion before it happens.

What we have done so far is to add grass seed to raw ground to prevent erosion and have picked up trash for the months of June, July and August. But these tasks were done by just a few individuals and now we need more help. It's a great way to spend a few hours of a day: going to a beautiful spot, cleaning it up if it needs it, then maybe going fishing afterwards!

If you are interested in volunteering for a day of monitoring and cleaning the campsites at Double Bit, contact either myself or Steve Perry. It is not difficult work and will go a long was in protecting the creeks, keeping the campsites open for camping, and furthering our good relationship with the Forest Service and DNR.

We have close to 30 years of participant surveys that show our program works! Between 65 and 75 percent of the women who attend a CfR retreat have never been to a breast cancer support group. 

Fishing Reports

West of Hiwassee: Icelandic Fishing

It's a well-known fact that Rabunites leave their home waters during our midsummer to go "West of Hiwassee" to ply our fly-fishing skills on both old favorite locales or even venture out to new uncharted territory unknown to them! Think Alaska is the land of the midnight sun, Iceland's nights are about the same as dusk in Dillard!

This is such a story about a fly-fishing adventure which, ironically enough, can trace its origin back to Gwinnett County and the Atlanta Fly Fishing show! Immediately upon venturing into the show there was an Outfitter who caught Jeanie's attention as he brokered trips in Iceland. Brochures were taken; reservations were changed and we planned to travel to Reykjavik; now you can get there going west although it's quicker to fly thru JFK International and then await your flight hopping it is on schedule as all of the service facilities including the new Delta One Lounge- close at 11:00PM and you move towards your gate for our 11:50 departure; unfortunately our departure was delayed about four hours and our meal was served around 5AM +\- and lamb was just not a breakfast dish on this Georgia boy's stomach. None the less we arrived in Reykjavik (the old abandoned US Military Base) secured our luggage and proceeded toward the exit looking for our driver; NAUGHT, and we found a taxi for the 57-kilometer ride to our hotel . . . When it came time to pay the fare, I thought we'd made a car payment!

Enough of the anticipation ant the next morning Onua "Una" picked Jeanie and I and we were off to Villingavatn In the wilderness of the national park. On that ride we passed by a secure confined compound and were amazed to find out that it was Iceland's woman's prison and had six (6) inmates which confirmed the country's low crime rate!

Fishing Reports, cont.

We entered into the farm where we were going to fly fish, parked and geared up for our hike -and I mean hike- about a mile and one half from our ride. The terrain was very challenging to navigate due to the semi steep terrain, rocks, wind, and marshlands! The fishing lake was in full view and only four rods a day were allowed; and it looked similar in size to Lake Rabun. when we reached the water, the guide was enthusiastically pointing to the other side where she wanted to fish as it was her honey hole and physically challenged before the lines were strung up, we said NO! To get to that side It was further around than we had hiked in thus far and an even marshier route than we had initially experienced.

Onua (Una) tied on a dry fly on my 9WT with an 8WTF line and 9' leader. Did I mention that the winds were 15 to 22 mph? I'd long since forgotten -lost- the muscle memory for loading the rod on a double haul although I doubt Lefty Kreigh, Flip Pallot, or even a fishing buddy from Everglades City Steve Huff would have enjoyed that challenge. Needless to say, neither of us had a strike nor caught us had a fish under these conditions so our guide went to plan B and returned with two dark side outfits!

Una filled the floats about half way and retired a fly! Well, with a 1-1/2 to 2 oz. Bobber on the spinning outfit I was able to get the 3' leader and magic fly out to where Onua wanted me to fly cast too; now the slow/fast retrieves begin as I painted a 40 yard wide area as Jeanie was also doing further down the lake.

The other two rods arrived early afternoon and I was tired so I walked further, sat down on the banks edge -with my feet in the cool soothing water- and began the same routine in my new location. No fish were biting on the other distant side either!

After a while Jeanie and I were both spent having had all the fun we could have told Onua that we were ready to call it a day! She offered to take us to another location but we elected on her other suggestion and to do sightseeing with her which we did.

And in closing it was a great trip in a magnificent country which we will never see again; and we caught 0 fish and had 0 bites; and the other 2 rods on the lake that day had similar results, even when they came back for Dark Thirty Fishing!
