Orange Stimulator aka October Caddis

HOOK: #2x Long Nymph

HEAD: Yellow Dubbing with Palmered Grizzly Hackle

TAIL: Deer Hair

BODY: Orange Dubbing and Brown Hackle

WING: Deer Hair

Great fly for the upcoming Delayed Harvest season! Drop a caddis nymph behind this fly and drag the bottom.
