# HOLD YOUR BREATH, HERE COMES THE PAST MONTH ACTIVITIES

A. CHATTOOGA RIVER Project - Sept 16th

1) Jim Nixon, Bill Kelly, Monte Seehorn and Doug Adams represented the chapter at the "Bug Collection" party, Oconee State Park. We were the only Georgia chapter there, but South Carolina TU, including the new Chattooga River Chapter turned out.

2) Durniak and Kidd with able assistance from other members, spent two days shocking the area around Pig Pen and below Big Bend, with fair results. Only one stocked rainbow was brought up at Pig Pen, and yet, earlier a friend of Doug Adams caught and released 8-10 rainbows and one large brown.

## B. REED CREEK PROJECT

1) Jim Kidd got a Road Construction & Maintenance specialist from the Coweeta Experiment Station to visit/tour/investigate all the roads in the watershed and make specific recommendations.

2) Glen Anderson and Jim Kidd arranged for Georgia Power Company to donate and deliver a truck load of wood chips to the Double Bit (Ridley) Camp

3) Eric Esche, Bill Kelly, Jim Nixon, Jim Kidd and Doug Adams, all expert at spreading it around, spread the chips over the entire camp.

4) Jeff Durniak and Jim Kidd, armed with their favorite fishing gear, and assited by Tom Nixon, Eric Esche, Bill Kelly, Doug Adams, Art Shick and Ray ?, got some most encouraging results on Hedden and Ridley:

5) Kidd and Adams, during several hours of torrential rain, covered all areas of the Hedden watershed, investigating and locating major sources of erosion and siltation.

6) Again, Jim Kidd, who has a thing about getting wet from head to toe, abandoned his family to fend for themselves in a heavy downpour and identified the problems on the new Burrells Ford Road and the Hicks Branch area of Reed Creek.

7) Marisue and Jim Kidd arranged for the USFS to purchase and spread gravel on the road to Double Bit. This has completely stopped the silt source in Ridley Branch.

8) Bill Kelly arranged for Vulcan Materials Company to donate about \$500 worth of gravel to the Glades Road on Hedden Creek.

9) Jim Kidd and Jim Nixon got the USFS and the Rabun County Commission to join in a co-op agreement to fix Glades Road. The county provided the trucks and drivers to haul and spread the gravel and donate fertilizer and grass seed.

10) Kidd arranged for the USFS to provide labor, tools and equipment to "daylight and reshape" Glades Road with the recommended "Coweeta Dips". USFS also donated the cover straw.

11) Another spreading crew, Jim and Tom Nixon, Jim Kidd, Doug Adams and Tom Landreth, spread seed, fertilizer and straw on the reworked areas of Glades Road. The grass is up and looks great! 2. TENSART
