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THE PARACHUTE WORM

Truly a classic, the Parachute Worm is experiencing a comeback with the avid trout fisherman. Admittedly, the parachutes are hard to come by, but try those out of the way bait shops - usually in the back room with the antique rods and reels. Simply attach your leader to the special "rip cord loop" and cast it high over the target area. Check your forward cast, opening the chute. A white canopy is helpful in recovery when the trout doesn't take - which is a rare occurence, indeed.

> This bait was first used by Bruce Herter, Jacque"s brother, when trolling for Angel Fish off the coast of Venice, California. Unfortunately, Bruce selected too large a pattern and was blown out to sea and eaten by a Mako Shark. The prominent trout expert, Bernie Swieback, observing this angling tragedy, wrote the now famous book, "Pattern Selection is Damned Important"

> > This book was shortly followed by "Matching Browns and Fine Bordeaux" now collected by Yuppies the world over.

Not to be outdone, one of the Rabun Chapter members, Bill Kelly, wrote "Matching Mash & Midges", now widely circulated throughout eastern Rabun County.
