

On January 9th several members gathered at Henry's Schoolhouse to tie flies under the expert direction of Henry Williamson. Since it's still winter, nymphs were on the menu and we learned several new patterns that will surely help in the next few weeks.



The CHATTOOGA COALITION met and came to the following decisions:

1) To stock in October each year by helicopter between Earl's Ford and Burrell's Ford, 25,000 sub adult Rainbows and 25,000 Browns.

2) Backpack into the Ellicot Rock Wilderness Area 50,000 Tasmanian Rainbow fingerlings and 50,000 eggs.

In an effort to scare more people off the river, a photograph of our prez, Jim "nugget" Nixon, will be featured on the 1990 Georgia Trout Fishing Regulations. Credit will be given to the Rabun Chapter.

The $\overline{\text{GAINESVILLE TIMES}}$ will do a feature of the Rabun Chapter in recognition of our winning the SILVER TROUT Award presented by TU National.

The Chapter has donated \$500 for the purchase of a thermograph by the U. S. Forest Service. This water temperature monitoring device will be installed with others in the Chattooga in an undisclosed and secreted location soon.

The Board of Directors of the Rabun Chapter met recently at the USFS office in Clayton to discuss upcoming projects:

- 1) Develop lower Reed Creek at the river for spawning enhancement and sanctuary during warm weather
- 2) The McDonalds/Town Creek area in Clayton
- 3) Dillard Community School project
 These proposed projects will be discussed at the February Campout.

This is a vital first step to accomplish the goals set forth in the Chattooga Coalition meeting and we will need all available hands to get the job done.
