Fly of the Month

Studies have shown that the ant is one of the most common food items in a trout's summer diet. These flies are very easy to tie and require very little materia keep the hockle sparse and let the fly go wet. Use it on a trailer behind a parachute of Wulff type fly. This makes it much easier to detect a strike as an ant tends to "discoppear" when used alone. Try sizes 20 and 18 on picky flat water fish. Save the 12's for Bluegills and such, they love them toc! Think Rain.
