Some good news for a change. North Carolina has LOWERED their license fee from \$50 to \$40 for a non-resident comprehensive fishing license. It also expires 1 year from the day you purchase it. Some friends and I discovered this as we drove over most of western North Carolina on a recent Sunday morning, looking for an outlet that sells licenses.

Doug Adams and I attended the public hearing at Unicoi State Park regarding the forthcoming Chattahoochee Hatchery closing scheduled for October of this year. The meeting was to let the public have their say and those present did. The DNR has no plan at this date and are in the information gathering stage. Meanwhile, our Congressional delegation from Georgia is trying to create

legislation that would delay the closing from 6-12 months. There seems to be several roadblocks. The DNR just doesn't seem anxious to take over; there is concern over funds despite the apparent willingness of the sportsmen to once again cooperate by paying a larger fee for a trout stamp; Wallop-Breaux may or may not be used for part of the financing; the hatchery needs a water treatment plant to continue operation. Will keep you posted as more is learned.

The Georgia Council voted to contribute \$2000 to the Embrace-A-Stream project on the Chattooga. That's the Brown Trout migration study. That completes the fund gathering process and Kyle will be busy soon scuba diving around and implanting little transmitters in the bellies of trout. If you catch one of these trout this fall, it would be nice if you released it so it can continue to go wherever it wants to go. We'll let you know how to recognize these fellows later.

Hot Tip On Tailwater Fishery

According to the news off the Internet, Dennis Baxter, fisheries biologist for TVA, reports that the Hiwassee River below Chatuge Dam in North Carolina is the place to fish. TVA has installed a weir below the dam that aerates the water and evens out flows. As a result, trout habitat has drastically improved. It is expected to surpass the South Holston, the Clinch, and the Hiwassee below Appalachia Dam (which is suffering from high water temps in the river and reservoir).

Fly Of The Month

Renegade

Hook: Dry Fly Style #16 up to

#10

Tail: None Wings: None

Thread: Black

Back hackle: Brown Rooster

Body: (Between Hackles)

Peacock herl

Front Hackle: Cream or white

This is a buggy looking attractor fly that is usually fished dry, but is also effective when fished wet, like a wooly worm. It has no tail or wings to mess with so it is very easy to tie. It is great on small streams in the east or west so take some with you to "west of Hiawassee" and use it on the brookie streams.
