Details: The Chapter will use Site #93 in the Wooded Loop as the "gathering spot". Meals will be taken there along with story telling around the campfire at night.

Campers should contact the <u>Park</u> and make their own campsite reservations. There are a variety of sites available, including furnished cabins, tent only sites, and campsites with full hookups.

We will eat breakfast and supper together at Site #93. Lunch is on your own. We need volunteers to cook suppers and breakfasts (except Friday supper).





If you volunteer to cook a meal then all other meals are free of charge to you. If you do not cook a meal, then you pay the cook \$5.00 for each meal that you eat. What a deal! The Chapter will provide stoves, paper plates, silverware, cups. Even if you don't camp, come by to eat a meal or sit around the campfire!

Friday night will be a communal steak and baked potato supper. Everyone bring your own steak and potato. The Chapter will have the grill and hot charcoal ready for you to grill your own steak!

Fishing Reports

Camping and Fishing Trip to Great Smoky Mountains National Park Brian Weeks, Feb 16

This past week, my bride and little eight year old girl and I ventured into the Great Smoky Mountain National Park for a half a week of tent camping. When we arrived Thursday evening at about 6:30pm, it was rapidly getting dark. On our way to the campsite, we passed a herd of about 40 elk. Not a bad way to begin the trip. Once at the campsite, we quickly set up the tent amidst snow flurries and an air temp of 17F.

The first night was the coldest we've ever camped in with a low of 8F. With more than one sleeping pad and sleeping bag per person, along with supplemental blankets, believe it or not, we were able to stay warm. The second night it "only" got down to 20F. Mere child's play by comparison!

Even though each night and day was cold, the air temps were trending warmer each day. In my experience, even if a particular day is cold, if it's part of a warming trend, trout tend to be more active. So I figured I'd wait until the later in the trip to fish to take advantage of that warming trend. That Saturday early afternoon, when I hit the water, both the air and water temps were 42F. I wasn't expecting much.

I'm almost exclusively catch and release in the park. But going into this trip, I planned to keep some for us to eat. Before I left the campsite to go fish, my little girl asked again if I was going to keep some for us to eat that night. She really wanted us to smoke a bigger one over the fire. The pressure was on, I had to deliver! And to my pleasant surprise, the fish were active.

They all came from a #14 hares ear variation at the bottom of deeper water. In warmer water, I'll grid the stream off and work just about every bit of it. But on colder days, I'll mainly target deeper water as, down at the bottom, that's generally where the warmer water is too.

The takes were subtle (no aggressive hits), but the fights were active. One even went airborne trying to get free.

By God's providence, that night we were able to smoke one over the fire, while bread baked in the Dutch oven. And I'm happy to say, my little girl thoroughly enjoyed her trout.
