### Wildlife Resources Division Draws the Ire of the Preservationist

On January 6th, Doug Adams and Tom Landreth attended a meeting at the Wildlife Resources Division's headquarters in Social Circle. The WRD had asked conservation and preservation groups to assemble to hear them out on their position relative to the USFS Rolling Alternative.

Their primary concern is that they cannot effectively manage lands included in officially designated wilderness areas. Wildlife openings, trout stocking, stream research would all be restricted if not eliminted entirely.

Since that meeting, Georgia Forest Watch has made sure the public reads their view and both an article and editiorial have appeared in the Atlanta Constitution. The article by Charles Seabrook presents a fairly balanced view, but the editorial came down hard on the WRD with a lot of misleading statements and unfounded accusations.

Word went out, primarily by E-mail, to concerned conservationists urging them to contact the Board of Directors of the Department of Natural Resources, supporting the position of the WRD.

Some of you responded with letters and E-mails to the board. Many others outside the Rabun Chapter did as well. Thanks to all who spoke up and supported our friends at the WRD.

To make a long story short, after hearing from all concerned, including Doug Adams, at a meeting last week, the Board lent their support to the WRD, while urging the WRD to seek some common ground with the preservationist groups.

The Board of Natural Resources has issued a resolution in support of the WRD and the complete text is contained on page three. I hope you can read it as it came to me as a fax and may not reproduce to well. If not, it will be at the next chapter meeting for you to peruse.

#### Stoneflies on the Trout's Winter Menu

With the streams here in the mountains running in the low forties, and mayfly hatches minimal if non existant, do the trout just quit eating? Nope! They just like to expend as little energy as possible and when they do so, they are looking for something worth the effort.

Now is a good time to tie on stonefly immita-

tions and drift them right across the bottom of pools and deep runs.

Most stoneflies are either black or dark brown. Large stonefly patterns like the Prince, Pheasant Tail and the like are good as well as the darker Wooly Boogers. You might even fish a WB with a Prince dropper. An indicator is helpful in detecting a strike.

#### RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF NATURAL RESOURCES

WHEREAS, The Department of Natural Resources' Wildlife Resources Division and its predecessors have been active partners with the U.S. Forest Service in the management of the Chattahoochee National Forest for over 70 years, and throughout this partnership has operated wildlife areas and managed front streams on the forest using license fees and federal funds; and

WHEREAS, both state and federal law recognizes that the Department of Natural Resources through its Wildlife Resources Division has statutory authority over and responsibility for management of all non-migratory wildlife occurring on the forest; and

WHEREAS, the Department and Division is in the process of providing input and recommendations to the U.S. Forest Service for the Chattahoochee/Oconee National Forest planning process, and this action is within the Department's statutory authority and in accordance with the normal operating procedures endorsed by the Board; and

WHEREAS, that input is being generated by a team of experts in wildlife, fisheries, natural areas and nongame species management, and is with the expressed approval of the Commissioner and the Director of the Wildlife Resources Division, both of whom are also professionals in the conservation field; and

WHEREAS, the Department's goal is to provide diverse habitat for a variety of wildlife species, to continue traditional recreational access to the forest, and to protect the long-term investments made in wildlife management areas and trout streams; and

WHEREAS, the Department also recognizes the need for areas of old growth forest that allow recreational solitude, but recommends that those conditions be provided by placing certain, desirable tracts in land management categories other than wilderness or wilderness study areas.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT, the Board of Natural Resources does hereby affirm the authority of the Commissioner and Division Directors to execute the day-to-day resource management decisions that are necessary for the efficient operation of the Department, including the authority to provide timely input and recommendations to other agencies, corporations, or individuals regarding the impact of their activities on resources under the care of the Department; and

THAT, the Board concurs with the need to develop a balanced Chattahoochee/Oconee Forest management plan that provides for late successional forests, retains traditional recreational access, protects the past investments of hunters and anglers in wildlife management areas and trout streams, promotes wildlife diversity by allowing habitat manipulation where needed and, recognizes and concurs that certain areas are appropriate for wilderness designation, including the elimination of new road construction and commercial logging in the more scenic and pristine sections of the forest. While the Board desires to be kept fully informed on the progress made toward completion of an acceptable forest plan, the Board supports the position statement signed by Commissioner Barrett and Director Waller on December 16, 1999, which clearly establishes the intent of the Department and desire by the Board to work toward a negotiated, concensus solution to the issue to the extent practical; and

THAT, the Board directs. Commissioner Barrett and Director Waller to advocate these goals for the forest management plan to the U.S. Forest Service, to the interested conservation organizations and to the public. The Board, through its Wildlife Resources Committee, is to be kept informed of this issue, and the committee's guidance and input is to be sought as deemed appropriate by the Commissioner or Director and that the Board be briefed at the February meeting of progress made in this regard and as appropriate and timely thereafter.
