

NEWS FROM THE FOREST

Two items that members of the chapter will find important when planning an outing into the Chattoahoochee National Forest:

The Forest Service is renovating the campsite at the confluence of Ridley and Hedden Creeks. If you have camped there, and who hasn't, you will agree that it really has taken a beating over the years from all who use it. There is virtually no vegetation on the banks where the two creeks meet and a depression channels runoff directly in the stream bed.

The Forest Service is positioning huge boulders in the camp to prevent setting up too close to the streams. They will be doing other work there that will hopefully result in a better campsite.

They are also putting in more access points on the Chattooga in the area known as Nicholson Fields in order for the hatchery trucks to stock more trout. While they could make no commitment at this time, this step could greatly enhance the chances of this section of the river becoming Delayed Harvest.


