KNOTS, LINES, LEADERS AND TIPPETS

At the February meeting held at Tallulah Falls State Park, **Henry Williamson** led a hands on session of knot tying that kept the experienced and beginner involved and entertained.

Do you still use the clinch knot to tie on the fly? The Duncan loop is faster, stronger and easier under all conditions but expecially useful in low light conditions.

The surgeon's knot (double overhand) knot

joins the tippet to your leader fast and effeciently. And whether you use the braided loop attached to your flyline for making the quick loop-to-loop connection, or if you prefer the nail knot, Henry made them all look easy. If you weren't there, you missed a good one. Thanks to Henry for his usual good job, and to Bill Turner, Ranger at Tallulah Falls State Park for making their facilities available

TRAILS ARE GETTING STEEPER

Several members of the Chapter could have told you this, especially those over forty....the trails out of some of our favorite streams are getting steeper. (Your editor has noticed this for several years)

According to geologist with the U.S. Geological Survey in Atlanta, the Blue Ridge mountains are rising at an alarming rate of about 100 feet every million years. There are a couple of trails out of the Chattooga that

must be shoving upward at a much faster rate than that

One scientist states, "..the slow motion advance of the North American plate is lifting the Blue Ridge as well as the rest of the Appalachians and the Piedmont".

Wow! Does that mean that viable trout streams will be created around Anderson and maybe even Columbia?
